

Describe present and historic physical appearance.

This two and one-half story limestone building from c.1855 differs from the other stone buildings in Bellevue, being a double storefront wide (44'x62'). Rectangular in shape, with a gable roof, the facade is located on the eave side and features two three bay storefronts. Two chimneys are located on each gable end. Upper level windows are capped by limestone lintels. At street level, the storefronts retain elements of the original design, as well as elements from alterations in the late 19th and early 20th centuries. Both storefronts retain the original limestone piers between the doors and display windows, and both retain recessed entries. The south half features tall slender round arched windows with wood panels beneath, while the north half has wider windows with prism glass transoms above, and wood panels beneath. Simple wooden brackets are found along the cornice. The stonework here is of coursed cut stone blocks which vary in size from approximately four inches to eight inches in height, and from eight to fifteen inches in width. Dressed stone is used for the sills and lintels.

The major changes in this building appear to be the removal of the exterior shutters, and the wooden awning that was in place in the late 19th century. Historic photographs also show a dormer on the east roof slope that has been removed, but few other alterations. The focus of the survey was on the use of limestone as a building material, and the emphasis was on exteriors. The interior of this building has not been addressed.

This building is located on the west side of Riverview Street, one block north of the City Park. It anchors the north end of one of the major business blocks in Bellevue, a block that has always been a major business area.

State significance of property, and justify criteria, criteria considerations, and areas and periods of significance noted above.

This building is significant under Criterion C as it illustrates the extensive use of limestone as a building material in this area for a variety of building types, including commercial.

217 limestone buildings and structures were recorded in Jackson County, including twenty commercial buildings. These commercial buildings appear to have been constructed between c.1850 and c.1870, with the majority (thirteen) located in the town of Bellevue. Bellevue was surveyed and platted in 1835, though land sales did not actually take place until 1844. The community served as the first county seat, and was a major trading center due to riverboat traffic. Some of the earliest commercial buildings in the county are located in Bellevue, this building being one of them.

This two and a half story double storefront building is a good example of commercial design from the 1850s executed in limestone. A significant feature of this building is the gable roof. While most commercial buildings in Bellevue have flat roofs, the gable roof type was often among the earliest constructed in many Iowa towns. Good examples are found in towns along the Des Moines River as well as the Mississippi. The stonework here consists of coursed stone blocks of varied size, with dressed stone sills and lintels. Both storefronts retain a remarkable degree of integrity, with three bay facades and recessed entries.

In many Iowa towns along the Mississippi River, the earliest commercial buildings of masonry construction feature the use of limestone (or heavy timber) lintels rather than arches. In general, it appears that lintels were used until c.1860, then arches became the common method of construction. The stone lintels served not only a functional purpose, but in brick construction, became a design element as well because of the difference in color and texture. With few exceptions, the commercials buildings from the 1830s through the 1850s were vernacular in design, though the lintels, and the often





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In 1845 Joseph Lucke came to America from Oldenburg. Germany, Five years later he opened a boot shop in the new town of Bellevue and in 1857 the store expanded into the present-day Lucke Shoe Store. The photograph above gives a feeling of what the early shop looked like as well as providing a good idea of how Bellevue's first residents appeared. The picture was provided by the modern-day Lucke family.

symmetrical facades, gave a hint of the Greek Revival or Federal style to the buildings. The limestone buildings of Bellevue are significant examples of this period and building type.

All Samborn maps show the south half of this building as "Boots & Shoes," with the north half as "bry Goods & Clothing" until 1914, when it became a "Grocery." Documentation shows the Joseph Lucke opened his shoe business in this building in 1857. The Lucke Shoe Store remained in this location until recent times.


