"Briarhurst" was designed for William A. Bell by the New York and Denver firm of Varian and Sterner. Fifteen years later, Sterner designed an imposing granite residence ("Glen Eyrie") for Bell's associate, General William Jackson Palmer and was employed several times during the interim to design railroad buildings for the growing Denver and Rio Grande Railway.

Constructed of native peachblow granite on a rambling plan at the base of a hill covered with stones of the same color, "Briarhurst" was designed in a late adaptation of the Gothic Revival Style as a reflection of the owners English origins. Noticeable characteristics of the Gothic style include the pointed arch, mullions, gabled roof and gingerbread bargeboards. The crested roof is marked by four chimneys (single and triple stack) serving eleven fireplaces. The main facade is particularly rich in design elements featuring four gables, two of which are decorated with gingerbread bargeboards; a Gothic-arched entry; bay windows and trabeated windows divided into rectangular lights by stone transoms.

"Briarhurst" was the second of two homes built for Dr. William A. Bell on a twenty-acre estate in the resort town of Manitou Springs. first house, also known as "Briarhurst," was built in 1873 and was wellknown in the community for 13 years as a favorite gathering point for Manitou Springs and Colorado Springs society before it was destroyed by fire in 1886. Dr. Bell hired Frederick J. Sterner, architect of the Daniels and Fisher Tower (NR, 1969) and the Pearce-McAllister Cottage (NR, 1972), to create the second "Briarhurst" and in the spring of 1888 the Bell family was able to return to its Manitou Springs estate and to a new home thereon.

Dr. William Abraham Bell is perhaps best-known for his association with General William Jackson Palmer, founder of the Denver and Rio Grande Railway, and for their joint efforts to encourage settlement of the Colorado Springs - Manitou Springs region. Born in England and trained as a physician, Bell first saw the RockyMountains as a member of a railroad survey team directed by General Palmer. Once settled in the Pikes Peak region himself, Bell directed considerable energy to the advertisement of the area among friends and relatives in England, many of whom did eventually emigrate to the Colorado Springs area. This highly influential British segment of the population was led informally by Dr. Bell whose homes became known as the center of social activity in the area.

The Bell family returned to England in 1890, but retained possession of "Briarhurst" for use during their annual business trips to Colorado. Dr. Bell died in 1921 and his Manitou Springs home was sold the next year. Since that time, the stone house has seen a variety of commercial uses, but retains its local significance, along with General Palmer's "Glen Eyrie," as a relic of the exciting first years of settlement in the Pikes Peak region and of the colorful leaders during that era.
