#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Philo Reed House, constructed of wood with shingle siding, is two-and-one-half stories high and has an attached carriage barn. Designed in a late Queen Anne style with asymmetrical massing and plan, the house has gable roofs with wide eaves, a corner tower and a large veranda. The windows consist of six-over-one doublehung sash which are square-headed, except for a single round arched stained glass stairhall window on the west side.

As was typical of the early twentieth century, the exterior ornament is largely Colonial Revival. This includes the Tuscan columns supporting the veranda (which has lost its roof balustrade, the pedimented dormer and the use of modillions beneath the eaves. An enclosed porch with neo-classical moldings is also located on the east side next to a two story bay window.

The interior of the house has Colonial Revival woodwork and remains largely unaltered. Especially distinctive is the front hall with panelled wainscot, turned balusters and newell post, and round arched closed door beneath the staircase. This woodwork continues on both floors and includes segmental and square-headed arches with fluted pilaster on posts supporting entablatures, cornice moldings and elaborate wood mantelpieces with bevelled glass mirrors. Several doors also feature bevelled glass in a variety of patterns.

The only significant alteration to the house is the removal of the balustrade on the roof of the porch. An early change was the conversion of the carriage barn doors from horses to automobiles.

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#### Builder/Architect Coombs and Gibbs

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Architecturally this distinctive Queen Anne house, probably the grandest in the town, is interesting as the work of Coombs and Gibbs, a Lewiston firm well known in southern Maine but whose work appears to be largely confined to Fort Fairfield in the northern part of the state. In this community they designed a number of buildings including a library, two schools, two banks, and a hotel.

The reason for this concentration of their work so far distant from their office apparently was due to the approval and influence of the owner of this house, Philo Reed, who came to Fort Fairfield in 1885 and died in 1926. He was one of the best known entrepreneurs in Aroostook County and a pioneer in the development of several potato seed varieties. The business which he founded, and which was later taken over by his son, Walter Reed, Sr., became "the largest potato seed company in the world". His grandsons, Walter, Jr. and John (a former Governor of Maine) continue the business, now known as Reed Farms.

Philo Reed also had an automobile agency, bred harness racing horses and constructed a race track in the rear of his house.
