DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE.

All Souls Church, at Scott, Arkansas is situated in Pulaski County and was completed in 1906. It is a wooden frame, one storey building with balcony. The exterior of the building is covered with Common Ashlar native stone. It is a simple rectangular plan with granite buttresses at the top of which are wooden brackets. Its Architecture is unique in its attempt to recall the Gothic style in a simple manner. The architect was Charley Thompson and the builder contractor was Mr. George Leifer, who also built the old 2nd Baptist church of Little Rock, Arkansas. His granddaughter is still a member of All Souls Church.

The gabled front is of half timber construction, and has a pointed cast iron ventilator for the balcony which lends a decorative touch. It has a gabled front porch with wooden columns and brackets on wooden pedestals.

The tall panelled double entrance doors are of wood and open into an entrance from which winds a hand carved narrow stairway leading to the balcony. This is reminiscent of Old Brutons Parrish in Williamsburg. To the left of the entrance is a small robing room with enclosed paneled cabinets. From the entrance through massive double paneled doors, an inviting wide aisle leads to a spacious chancel, on either side of which are handmade choir seats. One step up leads to a rounded dais on which rests a massive oak pulpit, flanked by two Gothic oak deacon chairs.

Above the original altar is a large stained glass window of The Good Shepherd, a memorial gift by the small children of the Church (The Church Mice). On each side of the Church are four stained glass windows set in pointed arches in double hung windows. Solid brass inserts are used to rail the windows.

A single brick chimney, reaching from ceiling to basement, told the story of the method of heating for this small church. Later an identical chimney in size but purely decorative was added for balance. Both are painted a warm grey to match the walls of the church.

Polished oak wooden trusses support the ceiling which is of matched beading, as is the wainscoting. These are all of polished warm brown stained oak. At the top of the walls, is a wide wooden cornice with interesting details of wooden dentils.

From the Chancel a stained glass windowed door leads to the outside, and concrete steps. This was used at one time for the entry of ministers and served the male members of the wedding parties.

The original Lectern, Communion Table, and all the pews are in the church and are of stained and polished native oak. The floors are pine and are covered with a rich cherry colored woolen carpet. A setting sun shining through the cherry colored robe of the Master in the west window casts a breathtaking spell on all of those who see it, and many an afternoon wedding is held at this magic hour. This church has long been used for the weddings of any who wish to use it.

Alterations to the little church have been minimal. The slate roof has been replaced and a more modern furnace has replaced the coal burning one.

Hand crafted Alter rail and choir seats of a simple design, again depicting the Gothic pointed arch feature, were designed and carved by M.K. Hodge, a renowned woodworker who also had lived in the community.

A white steeple with cross of Colonial Architecture was added later as a memorial to the great grandson of one of the pioneer planters and members. This adds greatly to the beauty of this simple country church rich in the heritage of the whole area.

A ministerial fund afforded the opportunity for three young people from our church to become ordained ministers. Miss Lucy Thiabault(Methodist), U of Ark., S.M.U., and Peabody College. Thomas Glenn Rathcote(Baptist), Yale. Donald K. Campbell(Presbyterian), Yale.

In 1906 The Reverend Mike Carroza and a small committee began plans for the fiftieth anniversary. The opening of the cornerstone of the Church and the reading of the contents, one small Episcopal prayer book being of great interest, again denoting the lack of bias, and the co-mingling of faiths in this unique rural church. A large reunion of settlers were gathered to rehear the history of the church and its people. Mrs. Alan Hicks Simpson, the sole remaining member who was secretary at the time of the laying of the cornerstone was present. A new cornerstone was placed in the church to be opened in the year 2006.

Since its beginning at the turn of the century, it has never closed its doors and is open to any seeking spiritual comfort, regardless of denomination or creed. It is one of the few Interdenominational churches in the nation.

The Eyrie is a one and one-half story frame structure built in 1906. It is of cypress construction with exterior board and batten walls. The building features double-hung windows and is topped by a roof with hipped gables. The Eyrie rests upon a full basement lined with brick. In 1921 an addition to the building was made, known as the Steele Annex. This addition is also of cypress construction. The interior of the Eyrie features beaded walls and ceilings, original pine floors, and original woodwork.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Church buildings were once the hub of most community activities in rural areas, Besides being the class rooms for Sunday School. The Eyrie (eagles nest or high place) was the result of a handful of pioneer families seeking a central place to worship. It holds many rich and satisfying memories for the descendants who still worship there after nearly a hundred years. The beginning of worship for these plantation families was in the parlors of the homes, and at the later part of the 19th century in a small church set in All Souls cemetery on the Scott Plantation. With a common Scotch mixture ancestry, and realization that only one Church could be supported, All Souls Church and Eyrie (Sunday School building) were completed in 1906. The fact that their fundamental basic beliefs were the same made this the interdenominational church that has been in continual use throughout this century.

The original Sunday school building, a narrow shotgun store, with planks on kegs for seats, a pedal organ, and a box for a pulpit began in 1900 with such enthusiasm that by 1906 enough funds were raised so that the present building was ready for use, and has been in continual use ever since.

The Eyrie has served many purposes, besides a place to worship. It has receptions, fellowship suppers, entertainments, Boy Scout meetings, and is the home of the well known Scott Sazer, started in the early 1900's with the men and women cooking and serving home cured hams, sausage, turkeys, geese and many homemade goodies, which drew a large trade from Little Rock making their journey in carriages.

In 1927, the year of the big flood, the building was used to feed and house many displaced persons for as long as three weeks. The women and men of the community taking their turn at feeding all those in need.

Third generation young farmers still on their grandfathers' land are seen worshipping in this same community building.

The Eyrie is a far cry from that long ago little country store, with the stables in back where horses and chickens lent their voices to the lusty young singers.

Architecturally, the building is a rural farm type building, simple and sturdy that represents the type of structure built at that time. All the structural wood is of native cypress cut from native breaks, and we believe sawed from the many mills that existed on the plantations at that time. The exterior walls are of board and batten cypress with double hung windows. The roof was made of cypress shingles, no doubt hand riven, as were all of the cabins and outlying houses. The roof has two hipped gables, which furnish light and ventilation to the half storey which at one time was used for a class room. There were two rooms in the basement, lined with brick made at the old penitentiary which were also used. The floors are pine and well polished and worn, solid and sound as the many men and women who have used them.

The land for the Church and Sunday school were given by Conoway Scott (for whom the town was named) and Arthur Alexander. Later Mr. R.L. Dortch deeded the land to the Church, which he had bought from Mr. Scott.

In 1923, Mrs. Tom Steele, Sr., a deeply dedicated worker reorganized the Sunday School and established the graded system. The classes leaped in their growth and a new addition was made to the existing structure which included a large auditorium, seating for dinner 200, additional class rooms, and a large plantation type kitchen.

The interior ceiling and walls are of matched beading. The ceiling is in the shape of a round arch. A large skylight at the west end gave light and ventilation. A stage on the east end of the auditorium is used for the many Easter and Christmas pageants as well as for speakers and visiting group singers. Santa Claus himself has often appeared to the delight of the many upturned faces in the auditorium.

New roofs, modern heating, painting and repairing have taken place over the years, but the simple country building remains untouched by change.

Thirty years ago, a landscaping plan was begun that is still growing. Two acres of ground are in the plans. An iron grill antique fence was given by the daughter of Dr. Witsell, pastor of Christ Church in Little Rock. Memorial marble benches, boxwood, hollies, and many other flowering trees add grace and beauty to the grounds. A fountain garden in memory of a great granddaughter of one of the pioneers, is the scene of weddings and other momentous events. The winding brick walk was made from the chimneys of the plantation cabins, many hand made, the gift of members of the church.

On each side of the Church are four stained glass windows set in pointed arches in double hung windows. Solid brass inserts are used to rail the windows.

A single brick chimney, reaching from ceiling to basement, told the story of the method of heating for this small church. Later an identical chimney in size but purely decorative was added for balance. Both are painted a warm grey to match the walls of the church.

Polished oak wooden trusses support the ceiling which is of matched beading, as is the wainscoting. These are all of polished warm brown stained oak. At the top of the walls, is a wide wooden cornice with interesting details of wooden dentils.

From the Chancel a stained glass windowed door leads to the outside, and concrete steps. This was used at one time for the entry of Ministers and served the male members of the wedding parties.

The original Lectern, Communion Table, and all the pews are in the church and are of stained and polished native oak. The floors are pine and are covered with a rich cherry colored woolen carpet. A setting sun shining through the cherry colored robe of the Master in the west window casts a breathtaking spell on all of those who see it, and many an afternoon wedding is held at this magic hour. This church has long been used for the weddings of any who wish to use it.

Alterations to the little church have been minimal. The slate roof has been replaced and a more modern furnace has replaced the coal burning one.

Hand crafted Altar rail and choir seats of a simple design, again depicting the Gothic pointed arch feature, were designed and carved by M.K. Hodge, a renowned woodworker who also had lived in the community.

A white steeple with cross of Colonial Architecture was added later as a memorial to the great grandson of one of the pioneer planters and members. This adds greatly to the beauty of this simple country church rich in the heritage of the whole area.

A ministerial fund afforded the opportunity for three young people from our church to become ordained ministers. Miss Lucy Thisbault(Methodist), U of Ark., S.M.U., and Peabody College. Thomas Glenn Hathcote(Baptist), Yale. Donald K. Campbell(Presbyterian), Yale.

In 1956 The Reverend Mike Carroza and a small committee began plans for the fiftieth anniversary. The opening of the cornerstone of the Church and the reading of the contents, one small Episcopal prayer book being of great interest, again denoting the lack of bias, and the co-mingling of faiths in this unique rural church. A large reunion of settlers were gathered to rehear the history of the church and its people. Mrs. Alan Hicks Simpson, the sole remaining member who was secretary at the time of the laying of the cornerstone was present. A new cornerstone was placed in the church to be opened in the year 2006.

Since its beginning at the turn of the century, it has never closed its doors and is open to any seeking spiritual comfort, regardless of denomination or creed. It is one of the few Interdenominational churches in the nation.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Church buildings were once the hub of most community activities in rural areas, besides being the class rooms for Sunday School. The Eyrie (eagles nest or high place) was the result of a handful of pioneer families seeking a central place to worship. It holds many rich and satisfying memories for the descendants who still worship there after nearly a hundred years. The beginning of worship for these plantation families was in the parlors of the homes, and at the later part of the 19th century in a small church set in All Souls cemetery on the Scott Plantation. With a common Scotch mixture ancestry, and realization that only one Church could be supported, All Souls Church and Eyrie (Sunday School building) were completed in 1906. The fact that their fundamental basic beliefs were the same made this the interdenominational church that has been in continual use throughout this century.

The original Sunday school building, a narrow shotgun store, with planks on kegs for seats, a pedal organ, and a box for a pulpit began in 1900 with such enthusiasm that by 1906 enough funds were raised so that the present building was ready for use, and has been in continual use ever since.

The Eyrie has served many purposes, besides a place to worship. It has receptions, fellowship suppers, entertainments, Boy Scout meetings, and is the home of the well known Scott Bazaar, started in the early 1900's with the men and women cooking and serving home cured hams, sausage, turkeys, geese and many homemade goodies, which drew a large trade from Little Rock making their journey in carriages.

In 1927, the year of the big flood, the building was used to feed and house many displaced persons for as long as three weeks. The women and men of the community taking their turn at feeding all those in need.

Third generation young farmers still on their grandfathers land are seen worshipping in this same community building.

The Eyrie is a far cry from that long ago little country store, with the stables in back where horses and chickens lent their voices to the lusty young singers.

Architecturally, the building is a rural farm type building, simple and sturdy that represents the type of structure built at that time. All the structural wood is of native cypress cut from native breaks, and we believe sawed from the many mills that existed on the plantations at that time. The exterior walls are of board and batten cypress with double hung windows. The roof was made of cypress shingles, no doubt hand riven, as were all of the cabins and outlying houses. The roof has two hipped gables, which furnish light and ventilation to the half storey which at one time was used for a class room. There were two rooms in the basement, lined with brick made at the old penitentiary which were also used. The floors are pine and well polished and worn, solid and sound as the many men and women who have used them.

The land for the Church and Sunday school were given by Conoway Scott (for whom the town was named) and Arthur Alexander. Later Mr. R.L. Dortch deeded the land to the Church, which he had bought from Mr. Scott.

In 1923, Mrs. Tom Steele, Sr., a deeply dedicated worker reorganized the Sunday School and established the graded system. The classes leaped in their growth and a new addition was made to the existing structure which included a large auditorium, seating for dinner 200, additional class rooms, and a large plantation type kitchen.

The interior ceiling and walls are of matched beading. The ceiling is in the shape of a round arch. A large skylight at the west end gave light and ventilation. A stage on the east end of the auditorium is used for the many Easter and Christmas pageants as well as for speakers and visiting group singers. Santa Claus himself has often appeared to the delight of the many upturned faces in the auditorium.

New roofs, modern heating, painting and repairing have taken place over the years, but the simple country building remains untouched by change.

Thirty years ago, a landscaping plan was begun that is still growing. Two acres of ground are in the plans. An iron grill antique fence was given by the daughter of Dr. Witsell, pastor of Christ Church in Little Rock. Memorial marble benches, boxwood, hollies, and many other flowering trees add grace and beauty to the grounds. A fountain garden in memory of a great granddaughter of one of the pioneers, is the scene of weddings and other momentous events. The winding brick walk was made from the chimneys of the plantation cabins, many hand made, the gift of members of the church.

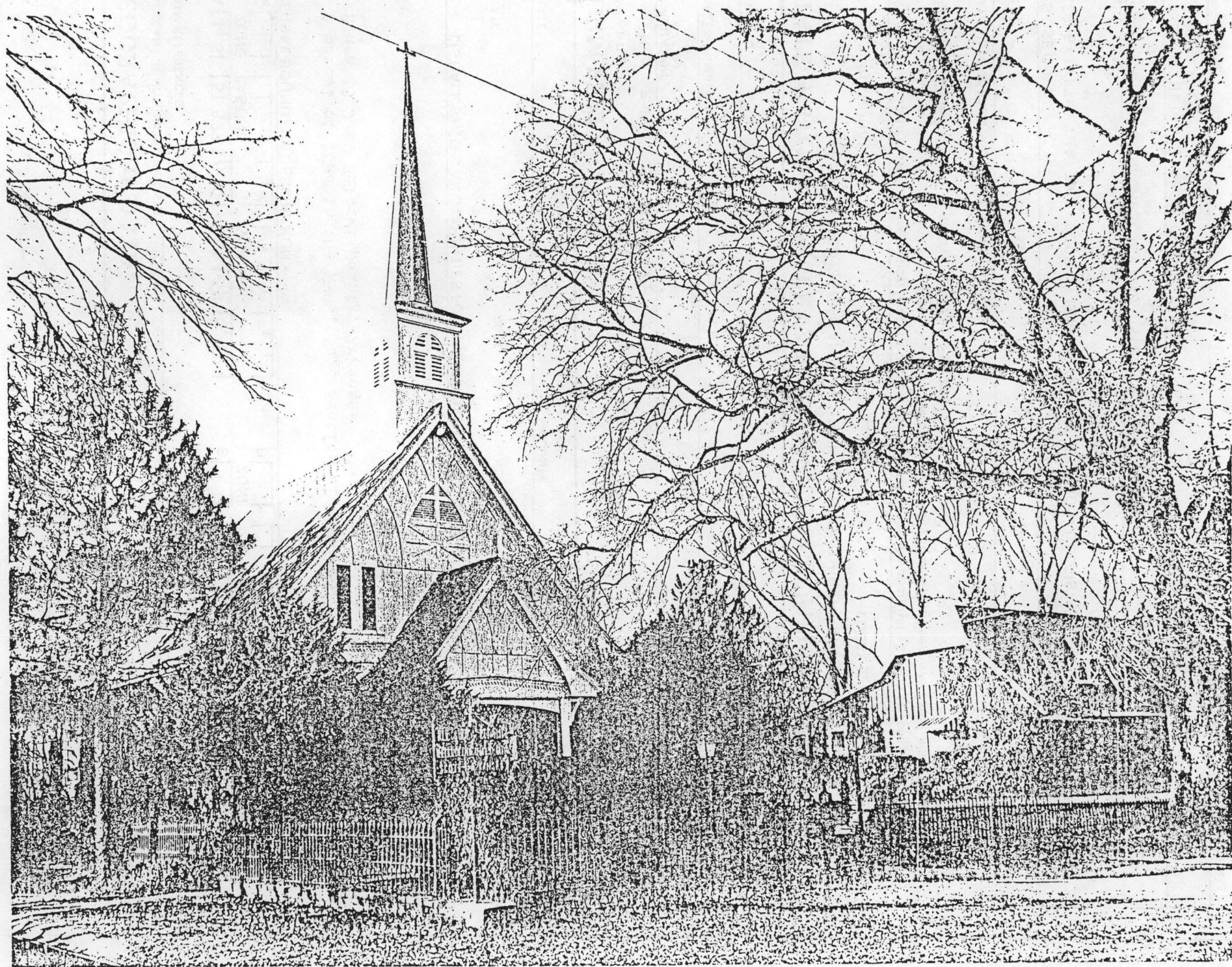

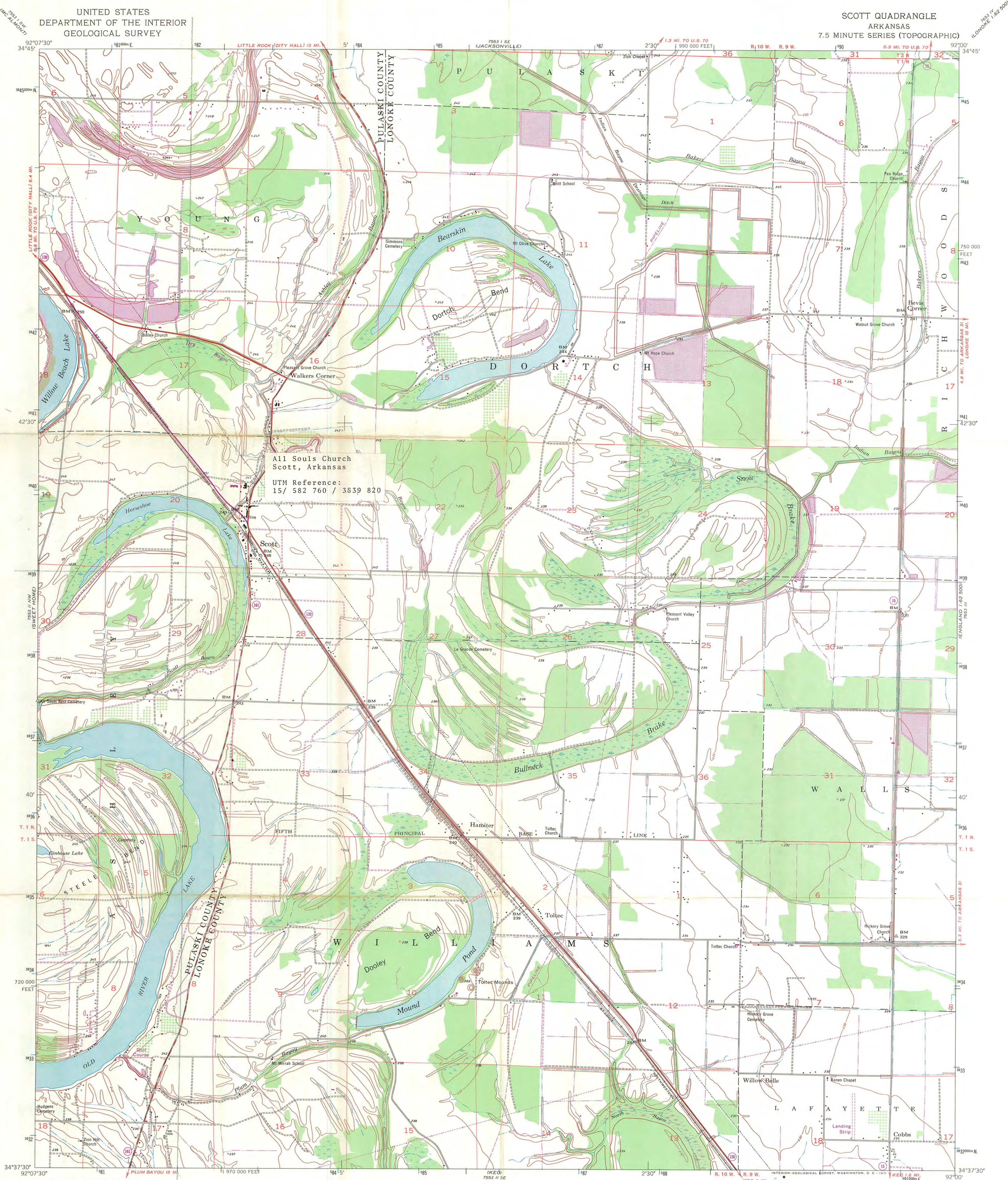
