18. Description
Late 18th-century, clapboard covered, 1 1/2-story "Cape" farmhouse with 5-bay facade, narrow window openings and central chimney. Except for 4/4 window sash (originally 9/6) and a few minor changes, such as addition of dormers, the house retains its original appearance. (Interior contains 18th-century paneling and large brick fireplace with oven). Extending from back of house is long 1-story ell, and to the rear is a large barn. The harrow ell contains original 9/6 fenestration. The 2-1/2 story barn is a "classic" New England example with weathered, unpainted vertical board surfaces and horizontal long window above door. 19. History
Built in 1795-96 by farmer and carpenter John Perry (1768-1863), eldest son of Ivory Perry who built the present Michael Walker house nearby on Valley Road. Occupied by John Perry, who was Selectman (1800-01), and his son, Thomas Perry (1803-1892) until his death. All of the Perrys were carpenter-builders, and Thomas was, as well, one of the few stone-cutters in town. Occupied by Perry family for over a century. Among subsequent owners were Frank E. Burpee (1897), Dr. Almond F. Townsend (1915), and Jane E. Dooe, for whose family the road is named.

20. Significance
The John Perry homestead is a good late 18th-century "Cape" example, virtually unchanged in original setting, and associated with family of early Dublin craftsmen-farmers, who owned it for over a century.

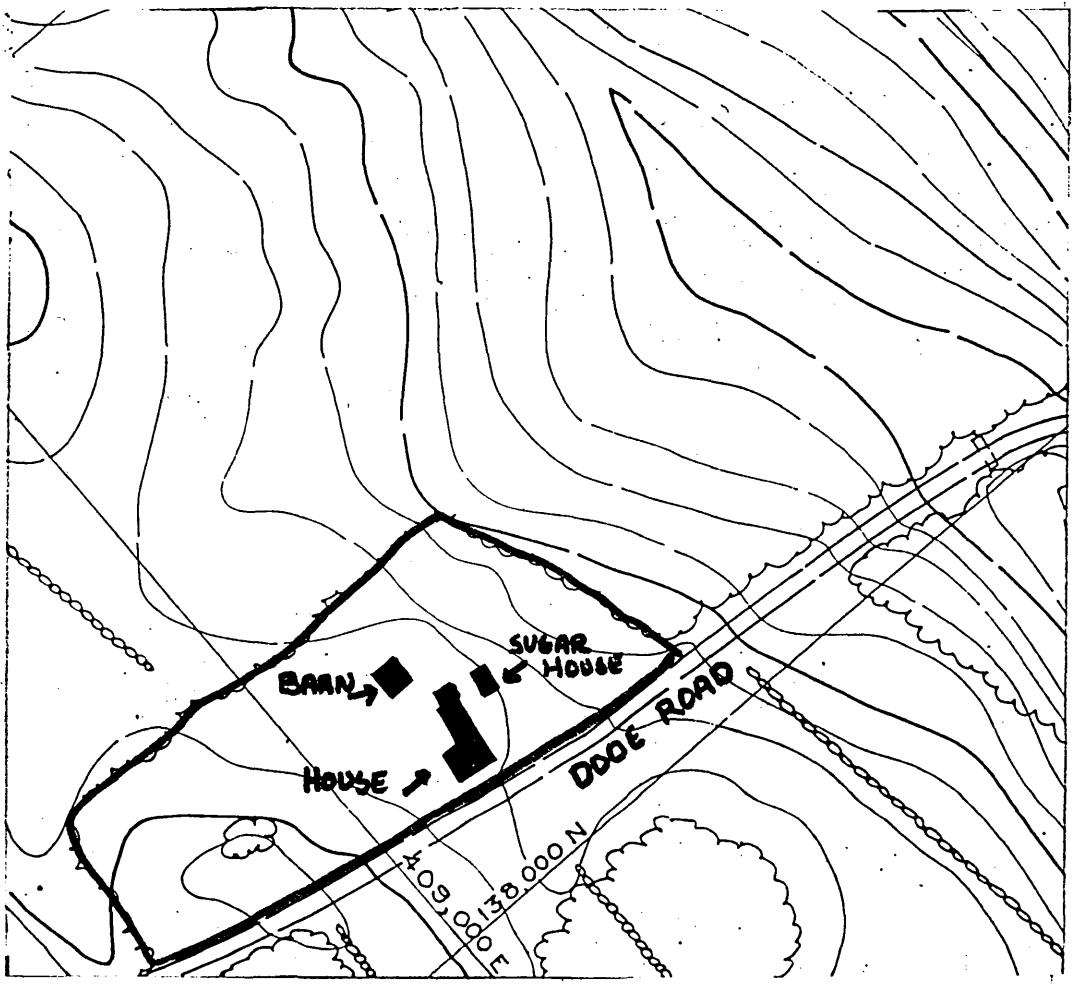

18. Description (continued)

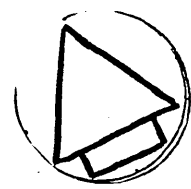
Completing the complex is a small, one-story, board-surfaced sugar house (with 12/12 window) just east of the ell; both this and the barn are early 19th c. vintage. This farm homestead is set on rolling slopes, with open pasture on the uphill (west) side, woods on the north, and low stonewalls and hardwoods lining the dirt road in front.
