DESCRIPTION SUMMARY:

Rock Creek Methodist Episcopal Church, built in 1900, is a cross-plan church supported by a continuous common bond brick foundation. The side walls are covered with aluminum siding over weatherboards. The gable ends remain unaltered with exposed layers of fishscale shingles. Rising in the southwest corner of the cross plan is a three-story bell tower capped by a pyramidal spire. The south (main) elevation is an asymmetrical facade with a gable-front and the adjacent entrance and bell tower. The facade has a tripartite Gothic arched colored glass window with narrow lancet windows to each side. In the sanctuary the pews are arranged on a semi-circular plan which is echoed by a semi-circular altar rail. The pews date from the turn of the century and have decorative ends. The walls are finished with beaded board wainscoting and plaster. Located against the south wall are three rolltop tambour partitions that open in case a larger sanctuary is needed. Hanging from the ceiling are a pair of turn of the century chandeliers. Standing to the west of the church is a single-story ell-shaped frame church hall built in 1928.

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GENERAL DESCRIPTION:

Rock Creek Methodist Episcopal Church stands on the north side of State Route 363, Deal Island Road, in the small community of Chance, Somerset County, Maryland. The Gothic Revival building faces south with the principal gable oriented on an east/west axis.

Built in 1900, the cross-plan church is supported by a continuous common bond brick foundation, and the side walls are covered with aluminum siding over weatherboards. However, the gable ends have remained unaltered with exposed layers of fishscale shingles. Rising in the southwest corner of the cross plan is a three-story bell tower capped by a pyramidal spire. The spire and the roof to the church are covered with slate. Standing to the west of the church is a single-story ell-shaped frame church hall built in 1928.

The south (main) elevation is an asymmetrical facade with a gable-front and the adjacent entrance and bell tower to the west. Fixed in the southwest corner of the foundation is the marble datestone, which is inscribed, "Rock Creek M.E. Church, 1900, W.J. Johnson, builder." The gabled facade has a tripartite Gothic arched colored glass window with narrow lancet windows to each side. A slender brick stove stack rises from the east roof slope. The south tower elevation has a Gothic arched wooden tracery on each side. The pyramidal roofed spire is covered by a metal cap.

The west side of the church is finished in the same manner as the south side with a tripartite window and flanking lancet windows. The upper gable is sheathed with fishscale shingles, and a narrow brick stove stack rises through the south roof slope.

The north side of the main building is distinguished by a shorter gable roof apse. Pairs of lancet windows pierce each side, and the north wall of the apse is marked by a diamond colored glass window. The sides of the apse are lighted by colored glass lancet windows as well.

The east side of the church has a tripartite window with flanking lancets, as well as a gable roofed section that extends from the southern leg of the plan. A narrow brick stove stack rises from the north slope of the roof, and the sides are pierced by a lancet shaped door and windows.

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The sanctuary has not been significantly altered since the turn of the century. The pews are arranged on a semi-circular plan which is echoed by a semi-circular altar rail. The pews date from the turn of the century and have decorative ends. The walls are finished with beaded board wainscoting and plaster. Repeating the use of narrow beaded boards, the ceiling is finished with a matched board pattern. Located against the south wall are three rolltop tambour partitions that open in case a larger sanctuary is needed. A Gothic arched nine-panel door opens into the adjacent Sunday School room on the east side of the main room. Hanging from the ceiling are a pair of turn of the century chandeliers.

The church hall, erected in 1928, stands on the west side of a ditch that divides the property. The aluminum sided ell-shaped frame building is supported by a rusticated block foundation, and it is covered with a medium sloped asphalt tile roof. Victorian paneled doors open through the south gable end, and the building is lighted by two-over-two sash windows.

SIGNIFICANCE SUMMARY:

Rock Creek Methodist Episcopal church is an important example of the rural Gothic churches built in Somerset County for the Methodist church in the closing decades of the nineteenth century. As seen in the Rock Creek church, these buildings commonly have complex Tee and cross plans characterized by corner bell towers, steeply pitched roofs, elaborate tripartite Gothic windows on the principal facade, and elaborately decorated interiors with turnings and panels. Rock Creek's significance is that it is one of the more elaborate examples built and still intact. Distinctive also is the semicircular sanctuary arrangement. In terms of age, this church is one of the last of the Gothic Methodist churches built in the county.

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HISTORIC CONTEXT:

The Rock Creek Methodist Episcopal Church is a prominent architectural landmark in this watermen's community east of Deal Island. Similar to other contemporary churches, including St. John's on Deal Island, Rock Creek has retained most of its original exterior and interior finishes. The three-story bell tower with its arched belfry of wooden tracery is an especially distinctive Gothic Revival feature. The interior is equally distinctive with a semicircular sanctuary arrangement, beaded board wainscoting, and a beaded matched board ceiling. Construction of this church is specifically documented by a marble datestone reading 1900. The church was erected by W.J. Johnson, whose name is inscribed on the stone.

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VERBAL BOUNDARY DESCRIPTION:

All that lot or parcel of land situated in Tangier Election District, Somerset County, Maryland, beginning for the same at the southeast corner of the church lot along Deal Island Road, State Route 363, and heading in a northwesterly direction for approximately 225 feet to the corner of the church lot that is a common corner with the Thomas H. Price land, thence by and with the line separating the Price land with the church lot in a southwesterly direction for approximately 337 feet to a point being the south west corner of the church lot, thence in a southeasterly direction for 225 feet to a point along the north side of Deal Island Road, thence in a northeasterly direction for approximately 337 feet by and with the aforesaid road to the place of beginning, containing 1.5 acres more or less.

BOUNDARY JUSTIFICATION:

The property includes only the rural lot upon which the resource stands.
