The widening of the engine door aperture and the installation of a new door occurred in the early 1970's, an alteration which caused the removal of one cast-iron pier and glass transoms directly above the former door. The fascia and letters identifying the building as "Engine Co. No.2" are original to the firehouse. SIGNIFICANCE: This firehouse replaced one which was built in 1880 and destroyed by a fire c. 1888. The location was integral to the northern waterfront's security, as the area was occupied by the Fletcher Steamship Co. at the river between 11th and 14th Sts. In 1886, the 14th St. ferry was established one block away. The new firehouse was built on land donated by the Stevens family. Architecturally, it is a fine example of the level of craftsmanship and design ability available locally in the 1890's. It represents the first instance of the integration of the firetower into the overall design scheme of a firehouse in Hoboken. It is stylistically unique as a public building in Hoboken; few buildings in the city were constructed in the Romanesque Revival with such a strong influence of the architect H.H. Richardson. It was one of the first group of public buildings undertaken by the city to be a self-consciously architectural statement . It has retained most of its original architectural features, and is the only building in Hoboken to have been recorded (photographically) for the Historic American Buildings Survey.
