

Physical Description

Located in one of Little Rock's most hilly, heavily wooded and scenic neighborhoods, this large two-story house was designed in 1927 by the Thompson and Harding firm. The earth tones and natural textures of the exterior, especially the generous use of rubble fieldstone, make this house one of the firm's most attractively rustic houses and cause it to blend well with its woodsy surroundings. The rectangular block is capped with a terra-cotta gable-end roof in natural color. Adding to the textural interest in the stucco used on the second story, the rustbrown brick on the first floor and the rubble fieldstone appearing in the huge asymmetrically stepped chimney, the recessed doorway surround, and the arches beginning the porch on the west. A large cross gable with pseudo half-timbering slants lower to the west to frame the stone arch defining the side porch. A series of arched openings on the first floor further enlivens the front elevation, appearing in the porch, the entrance, and in the transoms of the two French doors flanking the chimney. At the east end of the house is a sun room opening onto the large terrace paved with terra-cotta tile. All windows are sash and multi-paned,

Statement of Significance

Thompson and Harding apparently worked together intermittently on projects after their partnership dissolved in 1925 as evidenced by their collaboration on the designing of the Boone House in 1927. The house, located in Little Rock's suburb of Pulaski Heights, fits appropriately in its wooded and scenic setting as dictated by America's phenomonon of the "romantic suburb." Featuring a Tudor Revival influence, the architects successfully combined several national textures to create a massing of splendid utilization and sensitivity which makes the house extremely compatible with its natural environment. The Boone House is an excellent illustration of Thompson's work and interest in texturalism during the later years of his practice.
