7. Narrative Description

The property is a two-story, brick masonry residence built during the Federal Period, circa 1817, for the son of a prosperous, early settler of Woodford County on family land. The agricultural landscape surrounding the residence, approximately 350 acres, has been modified into a modern Thoroughbred farm landscape within the past twenty years (or less). No historic agricultural buildings or distinctive land patterns remain with the acreage. Two buildings are located in the rear yard area, a modern garage and extensively remodeled historic quarters, now used for a farm office. Neither building contributes to the understanding or significance of the nominated residence. The garage is included within the proposed nominated boundary area of 4 acres and is counted as a non-contributing building.

The Samuel Wallace House, locally known by its historic name of Calumet, is an impressive, two-story, double pile Federal residence, set back from the north side of the Old Frankfort Pike about 400 feet. When built, the community of Leesburg to the west was a thriving crossroad with stage station and mercantile (now Nugents Crossroads, see Historic District nomination, part of this MPL). The front, five bay facade is laid in Flemish bond (painted for the first time within the past 20 years) with Queen's closers and regular spaced pilasters that divide the front into balanced bays. The hip roof, clad with asphalt shingles, is pierced by four end chimneys that project slightly from the wall plane; about the distance of the pilasters. Topping the hip is a widow's walk, reached via a stair in the A deeply molded cornice extends across the facade, wrapping the tops of the pilasters with a capitol effect. cornice breaks over the central bay, spanned by a blind arch with large lunette with some colored glass that appears to be original in colors of blue, gold and ruby. The foundation is of limestone with a slight water table and some later pointing with square, raised mortar bed. Windows are six-over-six sash with simply molded architrave, flat arch lintels and stone sills (shutters A central, single-story portico (a later not original). antebellum addition according to Lancaster: 1991), is topped by a flat roof with urn-shaped, ballustraded deck. Opening to the second floor deck are recently installed, double doors with multi-light panes, solid transom and side lights. (Photographs taken in 1941 and 1974 indicate a sash window flanked by inset shutters at this opening. The inset shutters may cover side The front entry features an elliptical fanlight with colored glass of ruby, blue and gold set into hand-carved, radiating mullions, separated at the center with a dividing band with curvilinear relief design. rectangular bases. Sidelights have eight lights with semicircular mullions, and are placed above rectangular panels with radiating medallions. The portico is supported by square, wood pilasters and fluted, Tuscan columns (hollow wood).

A 20th century, one-story, brick veneer shed extends across the full rear of the residence with concrete block foundation and recessed, central porch/entry. The original rear wall entry displays 6-over-2 paneled, leaf doors and plain sidelights over rectangular panels.

The interior is well maintained with good integrity, a center passage plan with stair in the rear half of the hall which is divided by an arch. The walnut stairway features a rear landing and open stringer with decorative relief design. Other interior details include ash floor throughout, Federal mantles, and panels beneath first floor windows. According to architectural historian, Clay Lancaster (1991), "Details inside the house are rather provincial. Aprons under the windows are embellished with three heavy sunbursts that look like flattened wheels with hubs, spokes and oval rims." (ibid, 171-172). He reports that the staircase is a replacement but does not indicate the source of information or when it was replaced.

The intricacy of building this residence is well displayed in the structure of the roof, visible in the attic. The hip roof is mortise and tenon framed and held with pegs. Most lumber displays fine adze or flat saw marks and is of an undertermined hard wood. A stair leads to the widow's walk on the roof and a hand built door, slatted for ventilation, provides access to the attic itself from the second floor upper landing. The attic is roughly finished and may have been occasionally occupied.

8. Narrative Statement of Significance

The Samuel Wallace house, Calumet, is architecturally significant under Criteria C on a regional level within the theme of domestic architecture of the settlement period, a context developed in the North West Woodford County Multiple Property Form. The property is a well-built and preserved example of a two-story, double pile residence from the late Federal period. The house may have been designed by Lexington architect, Matthew Kennedy, an individual whose architectural contributions influenced decades of regional design in the Commonwealth.

Rather than describing the interior details as provincial, which refer to simplicity and relative plainness in furnishings, Calumet's interior woodwork and details are the unique and intricate examples of an unknown carpenter's art. Although the scale, proportions of individual components and overall design motifs may not be as sophisticated as other area representations, they nevertheless are important material evidence of stylistic interpretation and craftsmanship during an era. The house, likewise, is a striking example of one of the largest antebellum plan-types built occasionally throughout the region: the two-story, double-pile center passage. Almost invariably, those who could afford to build such homes were individuals of local prominence with substantial, agrarian-based wealth. To local scholar and visitor alike, homes like Calumet are recognizable as noteworthy examples of prosperous living in a bucolic setting.

The property is historically associated with members of the Wallace family, prominent in Woodford county agriculture and politics for many years and with Senator and businessman, Henry L. Martin, who lived here from 1882 until his death in 1942.

Samuel Wallace built this home on land first owned by his pioneer father, Judge Caleb Wallace, circa 1820 (see Lewis Payne House National Register nomination for information on Caleb Wallace). Caleb and several members of his family figured prominently in late 18th and 19th century social, political and agricultural circles of Woodford County. The property left the Wallace family in the mid-19th century and changed ownership several times before being purchased by Henry L. Martin, who at the age of 34, had already established his fortune in livestock. Martin's political and professional endeavors included serving in the Kentucky senate from 1893 to 1896 and as director and President of the Citizens Bank of Midway. During much of his adult life, Martin maintained dual residences in Woodford County and New Orleans, managing a livestock corporation that specialized in mules, and operating a sugar plantation. lived at Calumet until his death in 1942 and is reported to have given the home its name when he purchased it in 1882.

The architect of Calumet is not known. However, it is very similar in form, plan, and detail to WD 112, Elkwood, a c.1835 residence attributed to both Matthew Kennedy and Gideon Shryock north of Midway (see Elkwood NR form with this MPL). Lancaster (1991) compares Calumet to the Kennedy House and to Grasslands (1823) in Fayette County, and extends his comparison to Auvergne and Bucknore in Bourbon, but does not mention Elkwood in the discussion.

10. Verbal Boundary Description

The property boundary contains approximately 4 acres and is defined by a rectangle formed by the lines drawn on the accompanying topographic map. That map was drawn from information appearing on the Woodford County Property Valuation Assessor map 39, parcel 36, for the property. Boundary Justification

The nominated property includes only the front and side domestic yard area that is historically associated with the residence and contributes to the integrity of the property's setting. Although the residence of a large farm, no historic agricultural buildings or landscape features remain to illustrate the context of agriculture. The non-contributing garage is included in the boundary merely to maintain the even, rectangular shape of the parcel.
