## Description

### Summary

The Fox Creek Stone Arch Bridge spans Fox Creek in north central Chase County, Kansas. It is on a county road located ½ mile North and ¾ mile West of the intersection of US Highway 50 and Cottonwood Street in Strong City, Kansas. The bridge is located over Fox Creek in the NW ¼ of Section 17 of Township 19 South, Range 8 East. The county contracted for a single arch limestone bridge to be built in 1897 and it was finished in 1898. No significant modifications have been performed to the structure to date. The bridge span length is 40', and the structure length is 55' (Edge of Wearing Surface to Edge of Wearing Surface). The bridge roadway width is 16', and the total width of the bridge deck is 20'. The bridge has a sufficiency rating of 47%.

### Elaboration

The structure consists of native limestone blocks combined with concrete mortar. The fitted limestone blocks were cut from a nearby quarry. The Fox Creek Stone Arch Bridge was designed and constructed in the limestone arch style that relies on compression of the stones for structural strength. This pattern is similar to other Chase County historic stone arch bridges. Compacted fill within the structure provides distribution of live and dead loads through the arch. The center of the bridge is graded to be higher than the edges and provides good surface drainage. The cracks between the stones and a good aggregate base provide drainage for the bridge.

The bridge was built by Chase County. A notice to contractors was published November 18, 1897 in the *Chase County Leader* newspaper asking for bids for a single arch stone bridge across Fox Creek. The January 13, 1898 edition of the *Chase County Leader* reports the order awarding the contract to Lantry Sons to build a single stone arch bridge on Fox Creek not to exceed \$2,000. Labor for the contraction consisted of a local work force skilled in limestone rock construction.

While showing some significant deterioration from erosion of the limestone, the bridge has remained in use for public vehicular traffic since its construction in 1898 to the present time, and is listed on the Federal Highway Administrations bridge inventory in Chase County. Structural inspections are performed biennially to evaluate the condition of the bridge. At the present time this county road and this historic bridge are part of the only emergency evacuation route for the residential part of Strong City north of Highway 50.

Fox Creek Bridge is part of the Community Connection Trail, a bike and pedestrian trail connecting, Strong City, and Tallgrass Prairie National Preserve. The bridge is a scenic feature of the trail as well as a connection between town and country.

### **Statement of Significance**

### Summary

The Fox Creek Stone Arch Bridge is being nominated to the National Register under Criterion C for its architectural significance as a limestone, single arch bridge and is to be included in the "Masonry Arch Bridges of Kansas" thematic resources nomination. The bridge is simple, yet functional with a single arch design. It spans Fox Creek, a tributary of the Cottonwood River in central Chase County, north of Strong City. The bridge's native limestone construction is typical of structures built in the area and is representative of the master stone builders and craftsmanship of this area. The bridge is located over Fox Creek in the NW ¼ of Section 17 of Township 19 South, Range 8 East.

## History

The bridge was part of the construction undertaken as part of needed road work as Chase County was settled and county roads became a vital part of every day business, farming and ranching. According to the local newspaper, *The Chase County Leader*, at least one bridge was washed away at this location. There was need for a strong permanent bridge. Lantry Sons (Barney Lantry & Sons) was contracted by Chase County to build a stone bridge in 1898.

The Fox Creek Stone Arch Bridge is one of at least five stone arch bridges remaining in Chase County, along with several stone arch culverts that are smaller than a bridge, by definition. The native limestone components are typical of the construction methods used in the area for churches, schools, home, and various infrastructure improvements. The use dates back to the early settlers of the area. Other native limestone projects in the area include the Opera House and Grade School in Strong City, the Municipal Building and Chase County Courthouse in Cottonwood Falls along with many stone walls and water way ditches lined with native limestone. Abundant limestone in this Flint Hills area continues to provide the native limestone for many projects.

The Fox Creek Stone Arch Bridge remains a part of the public highway transportation system for Chase County and used by typical rural traffic. The bridge is part of the Community Connection Trail. This will be a bicycle and pedestrian pathway between Cottonwood Falls, Strong City and the Fox Creek Bottomland Trails of the Tallgrass Prairie National Park.

The bridge has been routinely inspected and with rehabilitation should retain structural integrity as well as being preserved as an example of local stone arch bridge building skill and visual enjoyment.

## **Verbal Boundary Description**

The boundary of this property is described as being centered on the county road right-of-way with the north boundary twenty-five feet north of the center line of the bridge and the south boundary twenty-five feet south of the center line of the bridge. The east and west boundaries lie seventy feet from the center of the bridge.
