#### Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The L.L. Stein House is a three story brick mansion built in neo-classical style. The L.L. Stein House has a hip roof with center gables. The shingles are green tile arranged in mission style. A single interior corbelled chimney protrudes from the roofline just behind the gable on the north side of the home. Each gable has a palladian window with multiple lights.

The front elevation includes eight white ionic columns, placed in pairs, supporting the roof. The roof extends beyond the front face of the building creating a two story porch. An additional extension of roof between the innermost columns sets off the entryway. Particularly notable is the entablature that completely surrounds the house at the roofline. The front elevation has four sash-windows, two to each story, and two doors; a single door on the first floor and double doors on the second. The second story doors open to a balcony with railings located just above the front entry door. All doors have side lights. Brickwork flat arches are found around the two first floor windows.

The south side elevation features six windows, including two at basement level. The north side elevation has four basement windows and five sash-windows (two on the first floor and three on the second). Three stained glass casement windows are also found on the north elevation. The only major exterior alterations of the home has been the addition of a rear porch.

The home has 22 rooms, including a basement and a fourth floor ballroom. It retains most original fixtures except lighting fixtures. The home is heated by the original steam heating system. The only internal alteration of the home has been the installation of an elevator.

#### Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The L.L. Stein House is significant because: 1) it is architecturally unique in Woodward, and 2) it was the home of L.L. Stein, a prominent banker in early Woodward. The L. L. Stien home is the only large neo-classical style building in Woodward, the other older homes being of modest pyramid homes or other fronteir styles. It is also unique because of its size, three stories and a basement, which is much larger than most other Woodward homes. The L.L. Stein home is one of the few remaining homes built by Woodward's pioneer settlers, and the town's only older mansion.

The home was built by L.L. Stein in 1918. Stein was one of the 5,000 or so original settlers who came to Woodward and staked out lots during the land run. Within a month of the September 1893 land opening, Stein had established Woodward's first bank, the First National Bank of Woodward. From 1893 to 1897 Stein's bank was Woodward's only such business. In 1897 the Gerlach bank opened to compete with Stein's bank, and later these were joined by several other banking establishments. The success of his bank allowed him to build this large home near the Santa Fe Railroad station. Stein's wealth ran out in 1931 when his bank closed. However, his importance to the overall history of Woodward has not diminished with the downfall of his bank; Stein's legacy lies in the fact that the First National Bank aided in the growth of Woodward during its early history by providing a pattern for sound economic progress. His home remains a symbol of that achievement.
