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The Herbert F. Johnson house is built across a shallow ravine on a gently rolling site. The lower levels are constructed of smooth-faced, red brick and follow the site's contours. This is sharply contrasted by the strongly horizontal upper level which is faced with lapped cedar siding. The horizontality is stressed further by a number of projecting balconies which shadow the lower levels so the house appears to hover over the earth kept in place only by the hipped, red-tile roof.

The plan is in the shape of a four-armed pinwheel radiating from a three-story octagonal hub. At the center is a massive stone fireplace. Flowing around it are the entrance hall, living room, dining room, and library areas separated by changes of level, low screens, and built-in furniture pieces. The interior walls are of the same brick as used in the exterior, and the space is lit by a series of clerestory windows and hidden lighting fixtures. Alongside the fireplace is a spiral staircase leading to a small observatory tower. Each of the four wings is "zoned" for a particular function. One wing contains the master bedrooms; the second, children's bedrooms and playroom; the third, services; and the fourth contains guest rooms and garages. All the rooms are linked by an in-house telephone system. The floors, as in the Usonian houses of the same period, are concrete slabs containing heating pipes. The building is now used as the headquarters for the Johnson Foundation, and the garages have been converted into offices.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Frank Lloyd Wright called the Herbert F. Johnson house "The last of the Prairie houses," and at the time it was built he called it his best designed house. It blends a number of elements characteristic of some of Wright's later work with the established forms of the great Prairie houses. The plans of the early Prairie houses were developed from the intersection of planes at 30°, 60°, and 90° angles. The pinwheel plan of the Johnson house is a development of the plan of the 1907 Coonley house in Riverside, Illinois, and is composed of angular elements. However, the transitions between spaces in the octagonal core are assisted by curvilinear forms reminiscent of those employed in the 1936 Johnson Wax Administration Building. The exterior form of the Johnson house is typical of the Prairie houses, but the facing of brick and lapped siding is not common in those early works.

The Johnson house is an excellent example of Wright's ability to create a house that compliments and is completed by a site that might otherwise be considered rather uninteresting. The house accentuates the site's gentle hill and gully. In his autobiography (page 476) Wright expressed pride in the way the house improved the site.

Herbert F. Johnson had first commissioned Wright to design the Johnson Wax Administration Building in Racine. He had recently married, and the house was to have been the residence for his young family. His wife died before the house was finished, however, and Johnson inhabited it for only a few years. An extensive farm unit had been planned on the property, but it was never built.

Wingspread is perhaps the most important educational and cultural conference center in the Middle West.


