Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Sited on a corner lot and topped with a hip roof, the two-story Erskine School has a raised basement and consists of three sections made of sandstone. The building exemplifies Richardson Romanesque architecture with its heavy masonry construction, crenelated tower, and round arched entranceway and windows.

The main block of the structure, built by Grams and Company in 1901, is a two-story, 22' x 812' rectangle with three bays. Its central tower has a wooden balustrade. Flanking this tower are bays displaying four windows on each level. The second-story windows are double-hung with square transoms while the lower floor openings have round arch transoms. The side facades are two-bay with the windows grouped in threes. These windows also have transoms. Double brick chimneys are located along the north and south walls and each facade has an attached metal fire escape. In 1912, a north (rear) ell was added to the school. The stonework and trim of this addition closely match the original unit. The windows are grouped in fours separated by wood columns on both the first and second floors. Above each column is a rosette. The gymnasium, added in 1926, was also designed to blend with the older sections. Covered with a hip roof, the rectangular gymnasium has four bays comprised of alternating sized windows. A recessed, arched entranceway separates the rear two sections. Surrounding the entire building including the tower is a cornice with corbelling and mouse toothing.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The Erskine School is significant in the areas of architecture and education. The building is one of the finest examples of Richardson Romanesque architecture in the City of Sturgis, highlighting native sandstone through rustication and contrasting intensities of color over the windows and along the water table. Erected after the first school burned in 1900, the building has continued to be the primary educational facility for the city.

As with many late Nineteenth and early Twentieth century public buildings, Romanesque features made popular by H. H. Richardson were adopted including its crenelated tower, masonry exterior and many of its door and window openings. The strong horizontal block, broken by the projecting central tower and rhythmic arched openings create an aesthetic architectural composition.

The Erskine School was named after the Reverend Carroll D. Erskine, who served as President of the Sturgis School Board and was a local Presbyterian minister actively involved in the social welfare of Sturgis' citizens.
