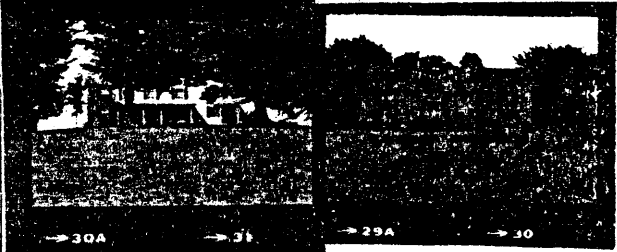

18. first floor of the facade and the rear are 6/6 pane with wooden lintels and sills, while the smaller upper level windows are 3/6 pane with wooden lintels and sills. The house sits on a limestone foundation and has interior gable-end chimneys. A one-story brick addition, also stuccoed, was built at a later date. A boxed cornice completes the building. Three _____ associated with the dwelling exist today. These are a one-story limestone smokehouse, which exhibits excellent workmanship, a one-story frame meathouse and a root cellar with limestone entrance.
