DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

Located about seven miles from LaGrange in the Mountville Community is the Nathan Van Boddie House built by the Troup County architect-craftsman, Collin Rodgers, circa 1836. This house exemplifies the architectural transition between the Federal and Greek Revival periods.

Facing south, the front facade is that of a two story weatherboarded, five bay house with a central, three bay colossal, primitive Ionic temple form portico. The entrance way is elaborated by two identical eliptical fanlighted doorways with framing, convex fluted pilasters around diamond paned sidelights on both the first floor and balcony doorways. A large sheaf-of-wheat balustrade on the cantilevered balcony echos this same diamond patterning. Flush siding is found only under this portico area and in the tympanum. Applied to the tympanum is an eliptical, dentil edged wood arch with keystone. Small, "bracket-like" dentils occur on all facades as part of the cornice. The fluted Ionic columns feature a stick flower design between the prominent volutes in the capital. Nine-over-nine light sash windows with louvered shutters are found on each facade. Two exterior common bond brick end chimneys are on each of the pedimented end gables.

In plan the Boddie House has a two-over-two room central hall design with a $40' \times 20'$ rear, one story dining room wing. All rooms are sheathed with horizontal paneling, except the two first floor parlors which are plastered above the wainscot. Panelled wainscot and wood ceilings occur in all of the main rooms. The central hall features a half turn stair with winders and a central landing.

Of particular interest on the interior are the outstanding sunburst mantels. The mantel in the east room has broad fluted pilasters supporting the frieze and shelf. The panelled frieze has a large, horizontal central sunburst and a vertical sunburst at each end. Other interior trim includes spiral formed, circular croissettes at the front doors.

The Boddie House, quite prominently set near the road is framed by a lane of old cedar trees.

Although the house has always been in the Boddie family it was restored in 1963-4 with only minor changes made.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Nathan Van Boddie House is significant as one of the most outstanding early nineteenth century houses in the state. As such, it is one of four houses known to have been designed by Collin Rodgers and stylistically represents a successful transition of the Federal to Greek Revival style graphed on the plantation plain type.

Built in 1836 for Nathan Van Boddie, an ancestor of the present owner, the Boddie House was designed by a local architect-raftsman, Collin Rodgers. Little is known about Rodgers (b. 5-7-1791; d. 10-25-1845), except that he is supposed to have worked on other LaGrange area houses, including Nutwood, already on the National Register. In all these houses his carefully precise classicism and his "trademark" of the Ionic portico with the stick flower design in the capitals.

Nathan Van Boddie was born in what is now Nash County, North Carolina on October 14, 1794, and died October 14, 1857. He married Elizabeth Williams Battle in 1818, and they came to Warren County, Georgia, from North Carolina in 1819. In 1828, when he arrived in Troup County and saw his lands on the Oakfuskee Indian Trail, it was in virgin timber. His first home was a two room dogtrot log cabin, probably in the Louise community about two miles north of the present house. He built up his land, which according to oral tradition extended as far northwest as the present Highway 29, and the present house was once the center of this large plantation.

The house was next owned by Nathan's son, Dr. Thomas Alfred Boddie. He was born in 1834, educated at the Jefferson Medical College, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, and practiced in Decatur, Georgia. During this time, the house was on the stage coach route between Griffin, Georgia, and Montgomery, Alabama. Mrs. Boddie accommodated travelers in her 40' x 20' dining room built on for that purpose. In the yard at this time was a separate two room kitchen which also was used for weaving.

Alfred's daughters, Belle and Vandalia, lived in the Boddie House after his death in 1894. The present owner is the great-grandson of Nathan Van Boddie.
