The Whitman Memorial Library is a one-story, three-bay, T-shaped frame building, the main block of which is covered by a high hipped roof. It is sheathed in weatherboards and wood shingles and rests on a brick foundation. The library is sited toward the rear of its lot that adjoins State Route 26 in the small village of Bryant Pond.

Facing north, the library's symmetrically composed front elevation features a pedimented entrance porch that shelters the central doorway. A pair of thin columns resting on low wood shingled walls support the roof. The doorway behind consists of a paneled door framed by broad diamond pane sidelights and surmounted by an arched diamond pane transom. Large singlepane rectangular windows flank the entrance. The elevation is further distinguished by the band of wood shingles which are located at the frieze level between the flat architrave and projecting cornice. This feature extends around the building including the rear ell.

The east side elevation is punctuated by a single, centrally located one-over-one window whereas the west end contains two such units. On the rear elevation, a one-over-one window is located between the east end and the projection of the ell, and two others flank an interior end chimney on the western side. The narrow, gabled ell has a rear entry and a window on the west side.

Inside, the library retains all of its original finishes. Its plan is typical of the period with a vestibule leading into the central delivery/ circulation area at the south end of which is the librarian's desk. To the west is the reading room with its mantelpiece on the south wall, and to the east are the stacks. Thin columns standing on low paneled walls frame the wide entrances to the two rooms. Narrow tongue-and-groove wainscoting is located in the delivery/circulation hall. The varnished cypress woodwork has aged to a medium brown color. Of additional note are the four styles of pressed metal ceilings which exist in the three rooms and vestibule.

The most significant addition to the library was the construction in 1957 of a basement. It was excavated inside the existing brick foundation and concrete walls poured, thereby leaving the original structure undisturbed.

The lot on which the library building stands is bordered at its western edge near Route 26 by a low rubble stone wall. This structure was erected at the same time as or shortly after the library was constructed. It was presented to the town by the Freeman family who were summer residents. After World War I a stone monument bearing a memorial plaque was erected near the northwest corner of the lot. **United States Department of the Interior** National Park Service

Completed in the spring of 1910 by local contractor Alton H. Bacon, the Whitman Memorial Library is a modest one-story Colonial Revival style building of frame construction. Funding for the erection and outfitting of a library was provided to the town in the will of Eleanor Bryant Whitman for whom, in conjunction with her husband Alanson M. Whitman, it is named. The library is eligible for nomination to the Register under criteria A and C as more fully discussed in the multiple property documentation form entitled "Maine Public Libraries."

The founding of the Whitman Memorial Library appears to have been the first time in which a public library of any kind existed in the Town of Woodstock. Its benefactors were both descended from two of the earliest settlers of the town, Samuel Bryant and Luther Whitman. Eleanor Bryant and Alanson M. Whitman were married in 1864 and spent their entire lives in Woodstock. In her will Eleanor Bryant Whitman bequeathed \$1,500 to construct a library building, \$4,000 to be expended "in good moral books of history, biography, scientific and miscellaneous works to be deposited in the building when erected and finished," and \$500 for furnishings.

As a condition of her bequest, Whitman's will required the town to provide a lot in Bryant Pond village "in good location as near the center of the village as possible." On October 23, 1908, a special town meeting was held to consider the gift at which a unanimous vote to accept it was taken. Herbert J. Libby, Horace C. Berry, and Eugene Cole were elected trustees. A lot was acquired from the Franklin Grange on December 7, 1908, although subsequent disputes about the boundary delayed final approval until March of 1909. At the regular town meeting in 1909 a building committee was appointed and plans prepared, with the building to occupy the "knoll" next to the Grange Hall.

In comparison to many of its elaborate architect designed contemporaries, the Whitman Memorial Library is a modest building in its exterior composition and detailing. Nonetheless, it clearly belongs to that group of specialized public library buildings which by virtue of their design, location, and purpose have an important place in their community. **United States Department of the Interior** National Park Service
