This house is significant for its architecture and its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County, New Jersey area. It is a reasonably well preserved example of the Form/Plan Type as shown and more fully described herein. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.

According to "History of Teaneck" the letters "WW" on the datestones beside the door stand for Wyntje or Lavinia Westervelt and "CW" for Casparus Westervelt, said to be the builder of the house. It is an early date for so large a house but probably acceptable. There was a wing to the north, which was removed and a frame wing built on the south in 1873. The British are said to have occupied the house during the Revolution and the family was evicted temporarily on two occasions -the second time being when some Hessians came. The last Westervelt to own $t \rightleftharpoons$ house was Peter whose widow sold it in 1905 to Dr . Nelson Ayers. About 1936 it was sold to Mrs. Estelle E. Miller. - CKT
