The old Rathdrum State Bank is a box-like building of modest proportions. Set at one of the principal intersections in town, the building measures 30 x 60°. It is two stories tall, with the basement raised enough to allow for a series of steps leading up to the round-arched entrance. The tympanum contains a large leaded cut-glass fan window. Flanking the front door are two narrow leaded glass panels. Matching the doorway on the narrow face of the building is a large window topped with a fan window. All other windows are double-hung sash.

The building is built of concrete blocks cast to imitate rusticated stone. The monotony is relieved by a continuous smooth band encircling the building above the basement windows and similar one below the second story windows. First story windows are all trimmed by smooth white cast stone lintels, all of which are bordered and connected by a narrow raised band. Second story lintels are smooth cast stone set in keystone fashion. The cornice consists of two narrow stepped bands in almost totally flat relief, emphasizing the flat roof line. A stone with the 1908 building date is set at the corner between the two cornice bands.

The interior of the building was furnished in typical bank fashion. Walls were lathe and plaster. Counter tops were granite slabs and furnishings were all of oak. A heavy steel vault was also included. Heat was supplied by a steam heating plant.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

By late March, 1908, plans had already been made to build a new building for the Rathdrum State Bank at the corner of First and Mills Streets. The frame building already on the corner was to be moved. The city jail, hose house, and bell tower were directly behind where the bank was to be built, so the city decided to have these buildings moved at the same time as the other. This stirred up quite a bit of controversy at the time, but the city council finally decided to move the buildings despite the objections.

The bank opened bids early in May, but did not accept any of the first bids and called for others. This caused some delay, but by the Middle of June, work was underway, with Thomas A. Parrot as contractor. Terms of the contract stipulated that the building be done in ninety days, but it was not until near the end of October that the bank moved into its new quarters.

The \$12,000 cost of the building included the furnishings. All furniture was of quarter sawed oak and counter tops were granite slabs. As the three slabs were being unloaded from the dray, they were accidently broken and had to be reordered. The vault had an immense steel door that took six men to lift into place.

One of the original settlements in that part of Idaho, Rathdrum preserves some of the appearance of a pioneer western community because nearby Coeur d'Alene displaced it as a county seat and as a modern, growing city. A plan to build the largest freight classification yard in the interior northwest (to serve Spokane) nearby may affect this historical oasis, but the citizens of Rathdrum want to preserve their serene and interesting community from the bustle of the Burlington Northern.
