

Description

The Clark County Courthouse is a three story brick and stone building. The courthouse is an Art Deco style building. Art Deco is identified by smooth wall surface usually of stucco; zigzag, chevrons and other stylized geometric motifs occur as decorative elements on facade; towers and other vertical projections above the roof line give a vertical emphasis. This style was poplar from late 1920s-1940.

The building features tan brick and a natural Artstone exterior. The Courthouse is three stories with a raised foundation wall of Artstone about one-half level above grade. All elevations feature symmetrical fenestration. The Artstone stone is used in the fluted pilasters on the main entrance. These pilasters have decorative motifs at the tops. All of the windows were replaced circa 1975, but the building retains excellent integrity. All of the windows now are a large fixed panel above with two smaller awning windows. The building also features a belt course between the first and second floor and lintel course at the third level.

The main façade features the main entrance with a three step entrance. The main entrance is an example of an ornamented door surround with an inscription that reads "Justice To All" and a stone eagle. On either side of the entrance, there are three window openings. The third and second levels have eight window openings with a basketweave brick pattern below. The two windows above the center entrance on the second and third floors are smaller compared to the remaining six.

The side elevations are identical. A center entrance features a simpler eagle. On either side of the entrance, there are three window openings. The second level has six windows. The two center windows have a fixed panel above with an awning window in the lower section. Five evenly spaced windows are on third level with a basketweave pattern between the third and second floor windows.

The rear elevation also features a center entrance similar to the other elevations. The first floor has three windows on either side of the rear entrance. A chimney interrupts the fenestration pattern. The chimney is located on the west side of the rear elevation between the fifth and sixth windows. The second and third floors have seven windows evenly spaced; however, the chimney is located between the sixth and seventh windows. The cornice features a center window along with an elevator shaft on the roof. The shaft has quoins and a small window.

Statement of Significance

The Clark County Courthouse is eligible for listing on the National Register of Historic Places under criteria A and C. The building is historically significant for its role as the symbolic and functional seat of government for Clark County. The courthouse is the most important single physical element in the historic and contemporary government of Clark County, and is an important local reminder of the importance of county government. It is also significant historically because of its association with the PWA era.

The Clark County Courthouse is architecturally significant as a representative example of early twentieth-century public and institutional architectural in South Dakota. The building is representative of an excellent example of an Art Deco style building.

Historic Context

Clark County was established in circa 1872. On May 23, 1881, an organizational meeting took place. This meeting appointed a probate judge, a register of deeds, a sheriff, a treasurer, and a surveyor. All the government offices were housed in the Clark House until a fire destroyed the building in 1882. County offices moved to the second story of the Clark County Bank building in Clark. The town of Clark became the official county seat of Clark at their first election of 1882. The bank served the county government offices until 1888 when the county built a new building on the western edge of Clark.

When the county offices out grew the 1888s building in the 1930s, officials discussed building a new courthouse. The county hired Hugill and Blatherwick as the architects of the building. Their design called for the use of stone, brick, concrete, steel, and tile. The style of the building is a representative example of an Art Deco building. The county hired Gray Construction to build the structure.

When completed on January 7, 1935, the interior included pink Tennessee marble and a courtroom with a modern ventilating system. The county offices moved into the new building on January 16, 1935.

This Art Deco building has suffered few alterations. The original windows were removed circa 1977. Despite this alteration, the building retains a high degree of integrity. The exterior retains its geometric shapes and decorative fluting pilasters. The interior changes are cosmetic only including carpeting, wiring, paint, and air conditioning.
