

#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The W. S. McClintock House was designed in the Neo-Classic Revival style by architect Charles Thompson of Little Rock. The house, completed in 1912, is constructed of wood frame resting on a rock-faced plain ashlar foundation. The two-story building's plan is essentially rectangular with single two-story bays projecting from either side elevation.

The house is sheathed with narrow (three inch) beveled wood siding with six inch vertical corner trim and a slightly wider horizontal band of trim at the second floor window sill height. The wall/roof juncture is defined by a plain horizontally trimmed frieze, plain wooden soffit (approximately two foot overhang) and equally simple fascia. This simple entablature bands the entire perimeter of the building excepting the tiered front portico.

The roof is gabled and apparently was originally wood shingled. It has, however, been reroofed with asphalt composition shingles. The gable ends, sheathed in the same siding as the body of the main house, appear as pediments defined by the roof pitches and entablature. The two-story bays are also gable roofed with pedimented gable ends. The large pediments are decorated by semicircular fan lights and the small pediments by roundels.

The front entry is enhanced by a broad rise of concrete steps with curving rock faced plan ashlar cheeks. A two-story entry portico, supported by six massive Ionic columns rises from the ground floor porch. A broad, three-part entablature with dentils banding the cornice/frieze juncture caps the portico's elevation. The portico roof is flat in appearance with a gradual slope to the front to facilitate drainage. Sweeping curved verandahs wrap from the portico around either side elevation at the ground floor level. These verandahs are supported by Roman Doric columns and decorated with a plain course and frieze. Initially the roof line was accented by a spooled baluster since removed and replaced with ironwork.

All exterior doors are oak with large (full door) single glass lights. All these exterior doors have leaded glass transoms in an interlocking diamond-in-a-circle motif. The front entry also has sidelights of the same design. The upper sash of double-hung windows on prominant elevations are also leaded in a pattern of vertical lines capped by circles. The placement of windows on the front elevation is symmetrical about the centered entry door while window placement on other elevations was determined more by their function relationship to interior spaces.

With only slight modification, mostly in the kitchen and service areas, the house's interior is as originally designed. Most original light fixtures remain as do most hardware items.

#### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The McClintock House, located in the eastern Arkansas town of Marianna, was constructed in 1912 by builder J. A. Keedy. Little Rock architect Charles L. Thompson desinged the massive Neo-Classic Revival structure. Thompson was the most prominent architect in the state at the turn of the century and was responsible for the design of many of Arkansas' finer structures. The historical significance of the McClintock House lies in its excellent architectural quality.

The McClintock House is a two-story frame structure sheathed in narrow beveled wood siding. Basically Neo-Classic Revival in style, the McClintock House is symmetrical in appearance. Located in the center of the facade is a massive two-story flat-roofed portico supported by two groupings of fluted Ionic-capital columns. This portico features a denticulated cornice. Three decorative dormers project from the facade of the gabled roof. A one-story, flat-roofed portico wraps around the corners of the facade to extend onto the side elevations.

The interiors of the McClintock House are especially notable with original quarter-sawn oak woodwork and original light fixtures. Mantels are uniquely designed in varying decorative patterns.

In 1912 the house was constructed for the W. S. McClintock family. W. S. McClintock was born in Oxford, Ohio, in 1865. McClintock settled in Marianna, Arkansas, in 1886 and worked in the logging business. He began a mercantile business which grew rapidly. McClintock soon had a machinery franchise, furnishing farmers in the surrounding countryside with needed equipment.

In 1950 the present owners, Mr. and Mrs. C. R. West, purchased the McClintock House. The large house has been maintained in excellent condition since its construction and serves as a landmark to the community. Architecturally, the McClintock House is a significant example of Charles L. Thompson's design.






