II. DESCRIPTION

ARCHITECTURAL DESCRIPTION AND PRESENT CONDITION:

One and one-half story frame residence of Victorian-era styling built on a central hall plan. High hipped roof covered in metal has four gables with diamond-shaped attic windows. Two gables are placed symmetrically on the front facade. A one-story porch wraps around two sides of the structure. Porch posts of wrought iron are replacements and a portion of the porch on the rear of the west side has been enclosed. The house is set on brick piers and the foundation has been filled in with additional brick. Windows are original one over one. The front door is also original and is identical to the door found on the Adams House (No. 22) on Hartwell Road.

On the interior, walls and ceilings are plastered and the wood floors have been carpeted. A wall which once enclosed the central hall has been removed in the living room to expand the size of this room. To the rear of the structure a former porch has been enclosed in the creation of the dining room, kitchen, and bath. The house is in good condition.

The house is sited on a city-sized lot with several large hardwoods surrounding the structure.

This structure was built in 1913 as the residence of R. L. Beasley. Beasley owned and operated a grocery store in the central business district of Lavonia. N. R. AREA(S) OF SIGNIFICANCE: Architecture, Commerce. LEVEL OF SIGNIFICANCE: Local

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE (ARCHITECTURAL AND HISTORICAL):

In <u>local history</u>, this structure is significant due to its association with the original owner, R. L. Beasley. Beasley was a local merchant in the Lavonia community for a number of years and operated a grocery business a few blocks from this residence. This structure is important as representative of the pattern of downtown merchants establishing residences within walking distance to their businesses.

In terms of <u>architecture</u>, the Beasley House is significant as a representative example of a locally common house style. Relatively modest Victorian-era houses such as this are found throughout the multiple resource area. Some occur in neighborhoods; others stand more or less alone. All are one-story high with a nearly square central-hall plan, high hipped roof, multiple gables, and wrap-around porch. They vary primarily in the level of detailing. This particular example is relatively plain although impressively massed. Minor alterations involving porch columns, partial porch enclosure, rear additions, and partial removal of hall walls are typical for historic houses in the multiple resource area. In terms of <u>commerce</u>, the house is significant as the home of R. L. Beasley, a local merchant who for years owned and operated a grocery store in Lavonia's central business district. The house is typical of those built for Lavonia's merchant class, which grew tremendously at the turn of the century.
