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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Hodgden House in Ellsworth is a 12-room two-story native stone building. The original rectangular structure measures approximately 30 feet long and 20 feet deep. A later addition to the building, which more than doubled its size, measures approximately 30 by 35 feet. There is no basement under either the original house or the addition. The walls are constructed of native stone which is hand hewn and laid in irregular horizontal courses. These massive stone blocks give a heavy, rustic character to the house. Mortar joints are not tooled, giving further emphasis to the massiveness. The roof over the original building is gabled and overhangs the wall below. The overhang is supported by widely spaced coupled brackets. The roof over the addition is hipped and overhangs the wall below. Both roofs are covered with wood shingles.

The main entrance on the north side of the house is accented by a large porch, which is gabled and has wood shingles. Window openings are simple rectangles with wooden double hung sash windows. The sills are single slabs of stone and the lintels are monolithic stones. An exception are the lintels over the second floor windows on the addition. These are made of angular pieces of stone laid in a flat arch. The second floor windows are also grouped in pairs.

The exterior appearance of the house is believed to be little changed from the original. The house is now used as a museum by the Ellsworth County Historical Society. Additional displays are housed in the large stone stable situated just east of the house.

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The Perry Hodgden House, now the Ellsworth County Historical Museum, was one of the first stone houses built in Ellsworth. Hodgden, who came to Ellsworth from Ohio in 1867, was involved in the development of the new town in various ways. He was treasurer of the Ellsworth Town Company, he owned a dry-goods store, he was post master for a time, he was involved in real estate transactions (he purchased an addition to the original townsite), he either operated or had financial interest in a livery stable, he helped organize the County Agricultural Society, he served as the county's Register of Deeds for one term and he was active in the city council.

In February, 1871, Hodgden purchased the lot on which the museum now stands. Later, adjoining lots were acquired until he owned a good portion of the block. His house was built in the late 1870's after a fire had destroyed the frame buildings on that block in 1875. Native stone quarried three miles from Ellsworth was used to construct the two-story house. A large addition was built onto the original structure in the early 1880's which increased its size considerably.

In 1961 the Ellsworth County Historical Society was organized and plans were made to acquire the Hodgden house for use as a county museum. A fund-raising drive began in October and by March, 1962, the society was able to purchase the house for \$9,000. The museum was renovated and opened to the public May 30, 1963. In August the Ellsworth County Historical Society bought the old livery stable next to the Hodgden house to display old farm equipment and other large items.

The Hodgden House is of local historic importance to the Ellsworth community because of the contributions of Perry Hodgden to the growth and development of the community.
