Built during the peak years for construction of round barns, 1910-1920, this is the only known surviving round barn built on an lowa farm by Benton Steele. Steele first built barns in the dairy districts of Indiana and Wisconsin and later in lowa, Nebraska, and Kansas. To advertise his work, Steele regularily wrote articles describing his latest design in popular agricultural journals of the day. Contractors such as Steele put farmers in touch with expertise beyond that of the local carpenter.

At the time of its construction the Nebergall Round Barn was considered a novelty - one well worth copying due to its many labor saving qualities. Cow stanchions on the main level, in circular arrangement around a feedway and grain bins, characterize this barn as a dairy barn.

Horse stalls and cow stanchions ringed the outer perimeter of the main level with driveway through the middle dividing the dow side from the horse side. Grain bins and feedways filled the void between the animals and the center drive. A separate hay chute serviced each side of the barn so that the horse hay and the cow hay could be efficiently stored and fed. The barn had a central drive with no silo.
