#### Description

The Churchill-Hilger House is a one-and-one-half story, plain vernacular wood frame residence with early Craftsman influences and dominated by an L-shaped recessed porch on its northern or front elevation and a hipped, bellcast roof lighted by three large, bellcast roof dormers. The plan is essentially rectangular and is entered via a single-leaf door at the back of the recessed front porch and two separate single-leaf entries in the southwest recessed porch. Two interior brick chimneys rise through the roof, one through the short ridge at the top of the hipped roof and the other through the western slope to the south of the dormer. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles, the walls are sheathed in weatherboard, and the entire structure sits upon a continuous brick foundation.

The northern or front elevation consists of the low, bellcast roof and its bellcast dormer covering the recessed, L-shaped porch. The dormer is lighted with a pair of one-over-one double-hung wood sash windows, and the northern and western walls of the L-shaped porch below are lighted with a total of three large, one-over-one double-hung wood sash windows. The sole, single-leaf entry is placed to the rear of the porch. The recessed porch is supported on six sloping wood box columns which rest on brick piers. The wood porch platform is accessed by two low brick stairs with stoops, one on the northern elevation and one on the western elevation. Any decoration is restricted to the long, thin cornice brackets beneath both the roof and the dormer, the sloping Craftsman columns, and the brick stoops.

The eastern elevation is lighted by an identical bellcast roof dormer and three of the same large one-over-one windows as seen on the northern elevation. Two of these windows are placed to the north and one to the south, with a single, smaller one-over-one wood sash window in between. The western elevation also features the same bellcast roof dormer. Three grouped one-over-one wood sash windows light the wall just to the south of the porch and a grouped pair of these windows are placed near the wall of the closed southwest porch.

The southern elevation is entered by the recessed porch to the west, which contains two entries (one in the southern wall and one in the western interior wall) and a window near the western wall of the house. The rear wall to the east is lighted by a pair of small, one-over-one wood sash windows and a larger pair of one-over-one wood sash windows.

The interior is largely intact and features the same simple moldings as seen on the exterior; the entire structure is largely unaltered and in good condition.

Two small associated wood frame outbuildings, a gable roof garage and a hipped roof storage shed, are included in the nomination.

#### Significance

The Churchill-Hilger House, named for Harry Churchill and Capt. L.W. Hilger, the historic residents of the house, is being nominated under both Criteria B and C with local significance: under Criterion B for its association with its original builder, Harry Churchill, the man who was in great part responsible for the early twentieth century growth and prosperity of the town of Pangburn; and under Criterion C for its being one of the earliest structures in the community to display Craftsman influences and one of the finest combinations of this style with an otherwise simple vernacular design.

Harry Churchill arrived in Pangburn, Arkansas, in 1899 with his wife of one year, Kate. Originally from Linn Creek, Missouri, Churchill came to Pangburn and the woods surrounding it as a representative of the Western Tie and Timber Company. His purpose was to purchase the best available virgin oak timber for the cutting of crossties and stavebolts. After doing so he hired many of the local residents to hew ties, an act which made him extremely popular with a local populace which had suffered the ravages of two consecutive poor crop years and was grateful for the employment. Churchill expanded the production of crossties to the point that by 1904 he was floating 24,000 crossties annually down the Little Red River to the nearest railroad spur in Judsonia. His estimated profit was 40 cents per tie, which by 1904 left him personally with sufficient funds to hire Jim Bunch, a friend and business associate, to manage the business for him.

Harry Churchill handed over the management of his lucrative crosstie business so that he would have more time to pursue his dream of obtaining a railroad for Pangburn. Churchill's vision of bringing a railroad line to this small town was motivated by more than his interest in procuring cheaper transportation for his crossties; since his arrival in 1899 Churchill had dreamed of transforming the economically depressed, isolated village of Pangburn into a prosperous, bustling town. In 1904-05 he made numerous trips to Harrison, Arkansas, the location of the division headquarters for the Missouri and North Arkansas Railroad Company (M&NA). Churchill attempted to make the argument to the railroad that a line through the mountainous, desolate Ozarks would open a territory filled with an array of virtually untapped natural resources the exploitation of which would prove extremely profitable. Much to the surprise of virtually everyone, in 1906 the M&NA announced their intentions to construct a line across the 260 miles from Harrison to Helena, on the Mississippi River. On July 16, 1908, the first train came to Pangburn and brought with it the greater access to the outside world and its markets of which Harry Churchill had dreamed.

The materialization of the promised railroad also resulted in the virtual redesign of the town, which would now orient itself to the railroad in virtually every possible fashion. New streets were laid out, easements obtained for sewer and water lines, and buildings demolished or relocated in response to the new focus of the town's activities. By 1912, Churchill, Austin Pangburn (the son of the store owner for which the town was named), and several others had prepared and assembled all the legal documents necessary to the incorporation of the town. On July 15 of that year, Pangburn became incorporated.

The effect of the railroad on the town was dramatic. Pangburn grew from a town with a total population of 25 in 1899 to 1,200 by the fall of 1912. Four cotton gins now operated where one had sufficed before. Sawmills, planing mills, and a stavemill sprang up along the railroad tracks. Churchill himself constructed five white brick store buildings in Pangburn in 1914, the same year he was granted a charter for Pangburn's first bank. He also donated seven acres of land for the construction of a new school and playground. By 1916 the six-block commercial center of Pangburn sheltered a variety of businesses, including a movie and opera house.

Though Churchill departed the town in 1917 after a series of misunderstandings and unsubstantiated allegations regarding his bank and its investment practices, Pangburn's prosperity continued well into the Depression and it remained an important commercial center for timber and timber products. However, the development and growth enjoyed by the citizens of Pangburn owed its genesis to the community spirit of Harry Churchill and his vision

of a greater, more vital town which he worked so hard to realize.

It was the year 1914 also that Harry Churchill built this home for himself and his wife. At the time it was considered a rather lavish residence, and by Pangburn standards that may have very well been true. The design is an interesting combination of relatively familiar vernacular elements (the recessed porch, the bellcast roof and dormers) with elements clearly drawn from the Craftsman vocabulary (the sloping, square columns set upon brick piers, the rather restrained cornice brackets). The entire composition presents an extremely clean, restrained appearance, with its asymmetrical, recessed porch creating an interesting counterpoint with the otherwise symmetrical facade which is underscored by the bellcast dormers echoing the shape of the roof. All of the elements are successfully synthesized into a unified design of simple elegance and proportion.
