#### 19. History

In 1792 Josiah Greenwood Jr. (b. 1770) paid 60 pounds to John Stone for 100 acres on this lot and soon thereafter built a log house here. Subsequently occupied by Josiah Wait, Jr. and then Micajah Martin, who most likely built the present house c.1802. Through most of the 19th century the farm was owned by Asa Powers and his son Elliott (b. 1801) from 1812-1872, and from then until 1899 by Selectman & Justice of the Peace Charles J. Ellis (b. 1845).

Purchased in 1904 by contractor-builder James Brockway (b. 1877) who lived here until 1908 when he moved one of the buildings to his new home on Church St. as a carpenter's shop. The property was used for heavy timber cutting until 1915 when it was bought by Mrs. Wm. Hemming Walsh, who restored and renovated it. Home from 1951 to 1966 of ecclesiastical historian Frederick Lewis Weis, author of <a href="The Colonial Clergy">The Colonial Clergy</a> of New England.


