### 18. Description

Two-story brick dwelling with a hipped roof, interior chimneys, and a five-bay facade. The two-story portico has a triangular pediment with modillions, an elliptical lunette, and paired Ionic columns of stone. The entry has sidelights and a cast iron balcony added in 1956 by Stratton Hammon, a Louisville architect. The wing at the west side of the main block was originally a one-story wing. In 1956 Hammon added the second story to the wing with careful duplication of materials and forms. The site is atop a bluff above the Ohio River. The approach to the house is a long tree-lined mall with a double driveway. Boxhill Lane is a narrow tree-lined drive which curves from River Road up the bluff and terminates at the southern end of the approach mall. Remnants of elaborate gardens are still visible.

#### 19. History

Boxhill was built by William E. Chess, president of the Chess and Wymond Cooperage Company. He bought 75 acres of land along the Ohio River in 1906, and the house is thought to have been completed In 1917 Chess gave the house to his daughter, Mary Grace Chess Robinson, wife of Avery Robinson, vice-president of a cordage mill. The Robinsons lived there until 1923 when they sold the estate to Henning Chambers, a brokerage firm executive, and moved to London and New York. Mrs. Robinson was the founder of the Mary Chess Perfume and Cosmetics Company in the 1930s. The estate was subdivided in the 1950s. Local sources attribute the design to Joseph E. Chandler (1864-1945), a Boston Architect whose special field of interest was Colonial American architecture. No plans or other documentation of Chandler's work on Boxhill have been found. of once extensive gardens, terraces, and stone walls can be seen. The gardens and the tree-lined mall are thought to have been planned by Bryant Fleming, a landscape architect of Buffalo, New York. Fleming designed a house in this area of Upper River Road in 1911, and the landscaping and gardens on other nearby estates have been attributed to him. (See JF-544 and JF-542). However, his work in Louisville has not been fully documented.

#### 20. Significance

Boxhill is a significant example of early 20th century Georgian Revival architecture. It is one of a number of large estate houses built in this period by prominent Louisvillians along the Ohio River outside the city. (See JF-531, 532, 544, 671 and Glenview Historic District.)
