DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (If known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Charles H. Burwell House was constructed in 1883 near the site of the first flour mill west of the Minneapolis area. This towered "gothic-stick-style" house exists today in basically the same configuration as when it was built with the exception of the addition of an enlarged porch prior to the turn of the century. The interior retains its period decor with only alterations being the addition of bathrooms and an undated kitchen. Since acquisition by the City of Minnetonka in 1970, preservation and restoration work has been in progress on the house and site.

The Burwell House was occupied continuously by members of the Burwell Family until 1958, when it was sold to the William Smith family. Even then Miss Louise Burwell, the last of the family to reside on the property, moved into the guest house (a small cottage adjacent to the house) for several years.

The landscape, as well as the economy, changed soon after Burwell's house was built. Originally the front yard sloped down to the mill pond. At that time Minnehaha Creek was navigable to Lake Minnetonka by steamer, and the Burwells had their own boat and dock. By 1897 a dam was constructed at Gray's Bay on Lake Minnetonka. The mill pond gradually disappeared, and Minnehaha Creek cut a narrow path in front of the house.

In addition to the main house are two smaller buildings. One is a board-and-batton millworker's cottage which had been used by the sawmill and later by the flour mill to house millhands. It is the only extant example of fifteen such cottages which were located at the sawmill. It pre-dates the Burwell house by approximately twenty years. The Burwells made this cottage into a guest house after moving it onto the property; it now functions as a caretaker's residence. The other building was formerly the mill office for Burwell's flour mill. It retains its original "Eastlakian" ornament and character. It has been altered by the enlargement of the door to accommodate its present function as a garage.

In general, the Burwell property has remained unchanged since the turn of the century and has been regarded as a property of distinctive local significance.

The village of Minnetonka Mills was the first permanent white settlement in Hennepin County west of the Minneapolis area. In this village Governor Alexander Ramsey officially named the newly rediscovered lake "Minnetonka" in June of 1852, meaning "Big-water" in the dialect of the Dakota.

By provision of the territorial charter a twelve-foot dam was constructed across Minnehaha Creek at a site two miles east of the Lake Minnetonka outlet. A sawmill was built in the village by Simon Stevens and Calvin Tuttle in 1853.

After an early fire, the sawmill was rebuilt and enlarged by the addition of a furniture factory and varnish house. This industrial development felt the economic impact of the Panic of 1857 and was forced to close. By 1860 both the sawmill and the furniture factory had burned.

Nine years later a four-story flour mill was erected on the site, eventually producing four hundred barrels of flour a day, with a onehundred-horse-power steam engine to supplement the increasingly q bill inadequate water power. Charles H. Burwell became the manager of this enterprise in 1877, purchaing it seven years thereafter. Under 1 200 Burwell's direction, the Minnetonka Mills Company prospered and challenged the laurels of the mills in Minneapolis in quality and distribution.

At the peak of this prosperous time for the town of Minnetonka Mills, Charles Burwell decided to build a fine new house for his young wife, Mary Dunham Burwell, on a parcel of land adjacent to the mill. This house, which has been referred to by many as an excellent example of the vernacular "carpenter-Gothic stick style", was completed in 1882.

This year was also the peak in Minnetonka Mills short life as a prominent industrial town. The mill was sold the next year to a Canadian milling company; however, this company never materialized to assume operation of the mill. Burwell repurchased the buildings a quarter section of land from the Canadian land holders and resumed operation of the process. The mill operated as a custom grist mill for a short period until operations were moved to Minneapolis, and
