DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Abraham Kellar House is located approximately 2400 feet south of KY 329 in southwestern Oldham County near the small community of Brownsboro. Facing southwest, the house sits on a slight rise one-half mile northwest of the site of the William Kellar House (listed on the National Register 8 September 1976). Approximately 200 feet east of the house on a branch of Harrod's Creek is a stone springhouse. To the north are two barns of recent construction and several smaller, modern outbuildings.

Originally a 1-1/2 story, ell-shaped structure, the Abraham Kellar House was enlarged ca.1835 by enclosing the angle of the ell, raising the roof, and adding the dormers. Evidence of these changes is visible in the brickwork; however, the changes were executed with care and the original brick bond pattern was meticulously retained. The five-bay facade is laid in Flemish bond and windows are 9/6 with jack arches (see photo 1). The stone foundation has been stuccoed. Three gabled dormers were added when the roof was raised; the larger, central dormer is laid in Flemish bond and contains a panelled door with a rectangular transom. A jack arch caps the opening. The one-story Greek portico sheltering the entrance also appears to date from ca. 1835 (see photo 2). The original ell extended from the northeast of the house and was one room deep, containing two 9/6 windows on the rear. When the angle of the ell was enclosed, two rooms were created, thus giving the house a rectangular shape. Windows added in the ell are 6/6 with jack arches, and care was obviously taken to maintain the bond pattern in the addition (see photo3).

The pitch of the roof is unusually steep due to the enlargement of the attic space. Evidence of the change is visible in the brickwork, but here again, the brick bond of the original portion was retained. Three frame dormers with 6/6 windows, like those on the main facade, were also added on the rear. A 6/6 window was added on the south gable end when the roof was raised, and the interior chimneys on both gable ends were rebuilt at the same time.

On the north side of the house is a two-room, frame wing with a projecting bay added in the late nineteenth century.

Originally the interior consisted of a single-pile, central-passage plan. Corner stairs with winders are located in the northeast end of the hall (see photo 4). Interior trim is plain, consisting of simple Federal mantles (see photo 5), and in the south room cupboards flank the fire-place. In the enlarged attic space, there is evidence of the existence of cupboards in the north end wall and chair railing around the entire room. The ceiling consists of beaded board sheathing.

The house has been vacant for some time and needs considerable work to make it habitable again. However, the building is structurally sound and the owners, who have just recently acquired full possession of the house, hope to restore it as their residence in the near future.

Dating from the first quarter of the nineteenth century, the Abraham Kellar House is one of the earliest brick structures in Oldham County. The house was enlarged shortly after its construction, and examination of the brickwork in the additions reveals that extreme care was exercised to maintain the brick bond pattern of the original portion. The early date of the building combined with the sensitive manner in which the alterations were executed make the Kellar House an especially distinctive structure.

The original owner, Abraham Kellar, was the oldest son of the Reverend William Kellar who organized and was the first pastor of the Harrod's Creek Baptist Church (see National Register form for the Harrod's Creek Baptist Church and the Reverend William Kellar House, listed 8 September 1976). The Abraham Kellar House is one-half mile northwest of the site of the William Kellar House and one mile west of the church. Abraham Kellar received the tract of land upon which the house sits at his father's death in 1817. Abraham sold this property to Thomas Yager in 1835. The enlargement of the brick portion most likely occurred at this time if not earlier.



The nominated property consists of approximately 4.5 acres which incorporates the main house and stone springhouse as well as the more modern dependencies to the north. The boundaries on the south and east (the ridgeline and the drive, respectively) are designed to encompass the natural setting of the house and springhouse. To the north, the fenceline which delineates the present farm complex is the obvious boundary, running to the northwest ridgeline. A line of convenience running in a southeasterly direction to the rear of the house from the fence to the southern boundary encloses the complex on the west.
