#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The McCauley House is a Queen Anne style residence. The structure, approximately forty five feet by thirty feet, is situated on a level quarter acre lot in a general business district (banks, stores, offices). Adjoining both sides of the lot are unpaved parking areas. The house is a one and a half story square structure with many additional features that achieve the qualities of irregular massing and interesting details characteristic of the Queen Anne style. These features include a hip roof with two ells, a dormer window and a balcony, an open porch decorated by turned posts and bracket and a flared conical shaped roof.

The building has a wood frame, a stone and mortar foundation and a partial basement. The exterior of the first story is faced with stretcher bond brick while the dormer and gable ends of the ells are faced with decorative wood shingles. The hip roof and the projecting ells are covered by wood shakes. The eaves have a flared bellcast shape with a small cornice and frieze. The raking trim on the gable ends of the ells has a boxed cornice with decorated moulding.

The windows on the front of the house are single sash and appear to be fixed. They are divided into four horizontal panes, the top one being a decorated leaded glass window. The side, bay and upper story windows have a flat top construction and a lug sill. The head surrounds are flat radiating voussoirs with a keystone while the side surrounds are plain.

The front door has a single leaf with two panels, the top panel being glass. The head surround has radiating voussoirs and the sides are plain. The architrave is plain with an embrasure and simple moulding.

One of the most interesting features of the house is the conical roof on the left corne of the front porch. This bell-cast flared roof is covered with decorative wood shingle laid in an imaginative pattern and topped by a finial. The entire front porch includin the conical roof is open and was once supported by turned posts with brackets. These posts and brackets have been replaced by plain pole supports. The originals have recently (August, 1978) been moved to the owner's nearby store to decorate its facade. They could probably be returned to their former location or duplicated. Another interesting feature is the balcony on the second story which rests atop the bay window on the left side of the house. It is enclosed by a simple railing.

There are two chimneys which are centrally located. The original chimney straddles the ridge while the more recently added chimney is on the front slope of the roof.


The first floor consists of two large rooms (approximately  $20' \times 20'$ ), two smaller room (one of which is the kitchen, approx.  $15' \times 10'$ ), a pantry and a bathroom. These rooms are in fair condition. In two of the rooms the ceilings have been lowered and linoleum has been laid on the pine floors. The decorative hardwood mouldings around the walls and doors are all original. The door lintels are especially handsome.

The left rear room has a corner brick fireplace with a decorative mantel. The naive but pleasing design of the wood mantel displays the work of a local craftsman. The spiral stairway ascends from this room into the upper story consisting of four small rooms (approximately  $10' \times 12'$ ) with sloping ceilings. The stairs have decorative turned posts and a banister. The original metal triangular insets are still in the

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corners of most of the stairs. The stairs have been walled up and a door added at the entrance to the stairs but this is of such a temporary construction that it could be removed quite easily revealing the spiral staircase from the ground level.

The foundation has settled and is cracked in areas but it is sound. The house mainly needs a major cleanup and repair effort on the floors, walls, ceilings and porches.

statement of Significance

Colville in the late nineteenth century.

BUILDER/ARCHITEC

The McCauley house is one of the first architecturally significant private residences built in the town of Colville, county seat of Stevens County, Washington. It is the only remaining Queen Anne style residence of significance in the county. The style reflects the prosperity of the town as it emerged from a frontier trading post to become a commercial center of the Northwest due to the building of the railroad through

Prior to 1889 and the building of the railroad, Colville was chiefly known as an outfitting point for miners eager to try their luck in the newly discovered mines in the hills around Colville. Silver and lead mining attracted many settlers into the area who decided to stay on as farmers and lumbermen during lean mining years. The railroad however, surpassed mining as an impetus for growth in Stevens County. A vision of Colville as a commercial center became a reality once the tedious process of team transportation was overcome. The population grew steadily and real estate values rose accordingly. Lumber, minerals, stock and diversified farm products were shipped all over the world from Colville's distribution centers during the turn of the century. Fortunes were made overnight during these years and most often invested in real estate. "The circulating wealth of the county in comparison with the number of people (made it possible) for every man to have a \$20 gold piece in his pocket."

H.M. McCauley came to Colville during these booming years and jumped into the real estate market. From 1900 to 1919 he was very active in buying and selling property from his office on Main Street. The office of McCauley and Smith specialized in "Town Property, Farms, Timberland and Settlers Located." He was also in the furniture business with his wife, Frannie running the store. In 1906 the McCauleys had built for themselves a substantial brick house with many distinctive exterior features attesting to their prosperity.

It is the only building representing the former residence of a prosperous citizen from the turn of the century remaining in what is now the central business district of Colville. It retains almost all of its significant design features and those features which are missing could be easily replaced. The four original lilac bushes planted by the McCauleys still grace the front lawn adding the appearance and feeling of the era.

The house was sold by Myron E. (Mack) McCauley, the son of H.M. McCauley, in 1919 to Cyrus Ferris Smith the owner of Smith Photographic Studio. Mrs. Ann Smith Taylor, daughter of C.F. Smith, provided information regarding the original appearance of the house and its neighborhood.


The present owner, Mr. Erwin Bell, is interested in restoring the property and renting the building for offices. If this is not economically feasible he plans to tear down
