Narrative Description

The Timpanogos Cooperative Marketing Association (TCMA) Building was built in 1926 along the east side of the Salt Lake and Utah Electric Interurban Railroad as part of the railroad's Snow depot/station at 380 South Orem Boulevard.¹ Currently, the building sits in the southwestern portion of an asphalt parking lot which covers the entirety of the property not physically occupied by the building itself. The TCMA Building is rectangular in shape, measuring 60 feet by 100 feet in size. A six-foot-wide by 51-foot-long open porch runs along the south elevation of the building. Along the west elevation of the building are a second open porch (17 feet 5 inches by 16 feet 7 inches) located just north of the southwest corner of the building, which adjoins an enclosed shed area (15 feet 7 inches by 32 feet 1 inch).

The building has been only minimally modified, is in good condition, and retains historic integrity in terms of its location, design and workmanship. The few modifications made to the building have somewhat affected its architectural integrity in terms of materials. Historic integrity has been affected due to the removal of the Salt Lake and Utah rails during the 1950s, although the street that replaced the rails, Orem Boulevard, still implies the path of the rails as it runs diagonally through an otherwise grid like street system. Also, there has been subsequent residential and commercial development in the surrounding area, and the utilization of the building has changed to varied commercial purposes, such as its current employment as an automobile dealership and martial arts teaching studio.

As a commercial railroad-related building, the styling is simple and sports few decorative elements. The building is covered by a low-pitched hipped roof with overhanging eaves and exposed rafter tails providing a slightly utilitarian Prairie School style appearance. The pilasters on the north, west, and east elevations are shallow and located at the corners of each elevation and between the main sets of windows. A foundation with minimum three-foot crawl space is formed of poured concrete. The windows have sills constructed of brick headers and wooden lintels. The roof is covered with asphalt shingles and the brick walls are laid in a stretcher bond with flush mortar.

The brick on the north elevation has been painted a light olive-tan color, although the soft pink/red colors of the original brick underneath are occasionally visible. A large loading door (rolling metal) and three pairs of double-hung aluminum-sash windows are present on this elevation. The wooden frames, headers, lintels, and brick sills of all six windows are painted red, and four of the windows are partially covered by blue, convex canopy awnings. An eight-foot-by-eight-foot wooden loading dock supported by concrete piers sits in front of the large loading door.

The east elevation, facing Orem Boulevard, has been refaced at an unknown date with very light olive-tan painted plaster stucco. Five aluminum double-hung windows, one aluminum sliding window, and a large glass

entry door with aluminum framing are present. All window frames, headers, lintels, and sills have been covered by the stucco and are also painted in red. Two white-painted brick wall chimneys located near the north and south ends of the building exhibit decorative brick corbelling.

In 1965 the cladding on the south elevation (facing 400 South) was covered with roman brick laid in both stacked and staggered bond patterns in various areas. The brick has also been painted in the light olive-tan color found on the east and north elevations. Three entrance doors (two are wood panel, the other an aluminum and glass storefront door) and three window openings are asymmetrically placed. The windows are aluminum sliders.

The west side of the building was the traditional loading area for truckloads of fruit brought to the building to be prepared for shipping on the railroad. The west elevation of the building was modified circa 1985 by extending the roof and partially enclosing the wooden frame loading area to form an open porch and plywood-wall framed shed. Two simple hinge-doors have been cut into the shed walls at its north and south ends. The original soft pink/red brick not encased by the shed modification is partially painted at the south end, but remains unpainted north of the enclosed shed. A doorway entrance has been cut into the brick wall in the open porch area. Two double-hung aluminum windows and a large loading door (rolling metal) are present in the brick wall north of the shed. A 17-foot-long by 6-foot-high concrete block wall runs west of the southwest corner of the building, blocking most of the porch and shed area from view.

The interior of the building has been more-recently subdivided by an interior frame and paneled wall which runs the entire north-south length of the building. These two spaces have been further subdivided to form offices for the car dealership and Tai Kwon Do studio (south one-third), a large practice studio (northeast two-thirds), and storage (northwest two-thirds). A drop ceiling has been installed throughout the building. The original, unpainted brick walls form the north and east walls of the studio area, and the north and west walls of the storage rooms. Although unconfirmed, these alterations appear to date to the mid-1980s.

Narrative Statement of Significance

The Timpanogos Cooperative Marketing Association (TCMA) Building, constructed circa 1926, is significant for its role in association with rail transportation and its role in supporting local agricultural commerce and economic growth. The property is eligible to the National Register under Criteria A for its association with the local history of the railroad and its influence on the development and growth of Orem, particularly in terms of expanding Orem's agricultural market. Orem was settled in order to exploit the geography which was ideal for growing fruit orchards and berries. This was the primary economy for Orem up through the mid-twentieth century. Additionally, the building is historically significant because it is the only railroad station remaining in Orem. The Salt Lake and Utah Railroad Corporation operated an interurban electric train, colloquially known as the "Orem Line," from Salt Lake City on the north to Provo on the south. "Orem Line" trains traveled regularly through Orem between 1914 and 1946, carrying both passengers and significant amounts of freightparticularly locally grown fruit and other produce-to destinations throughout Utah as well other areas of the country. Local produce was brought to one of several packing sheds built as part of the railroad's Snow Station/Freight Depot for processing and shipment. Locally grown crops were delivered and unloaded on the west side of the building, then packed, sorted, and prepared for eventual rail shipment across the country. The building remains a good example of industrial/commercial architecture influenced by the style. The building is being nominated under the Historic Resources of Orem, Utah Multiple Property Submission, with the primary context being "Establishment of Orem: 1914-1941." The building has a period of significance dating 1926-1951, during its use as a railroad station and for the role it played in expanding agricultural markets and regional transportation.

Orem (known until 1913 as Provo Bench) developed as a second-generation Mormon precinct owing to the expansion of Pleasant Grove (Battle Creek) to its north and Provo to its south following the construction of the Provo Bench canal in 1864.¹ Although originally little more than a simple irrigation ditch, the canal brought water to a parched area and provided the impetus for more irrigation projects, eventually leading to increased agricultural production. The area remained mainly agricultural fields until 1869, when the US Government offered land to homesteaders for \$1.25 an acre, providing that they occupied a permanent dwelling for six months a year over a five-year period.² The first full-time homesteaders, the Thomas Cordner family, "proved a catalyst in encouraging others to permanently settle their property."³

With improved irrigation and expanded canal construction, farming became increasingly productive. Of the many different crops planted, the most successful were orchards, and soon peaches, apples, cherries, apricots and plums were being harvested and locally distributed. In 1919, the settlers on Provo Bench (Orem) petitioned the Utah County Commission for a town charter, which was formally granted on 5 May 1919 and sealed on 7 July 1919. The new community was long and narrow, with farm houses facing the highway and farmland stretching out behind in rectangular lots. "The establishment of the new community brought together two

church/school centers some two miles apart, with the express purpose of consolidating the water resources for irrigation purposes. The new municipality was named Orem in honor of Walter C. Orem, president of the Salt Lake and Utah Railway, and development followed the rail corridor as new residences and businesses continued to locate along the highway."⁴ In addition to the agricultural industry, other early businesses consisted of a molasses mill, an adobe yard, and a well-digging operation. A country store was opened by Melissa L. McBride in 1890, and a blacksmith shop opened in 1900 at the corner of 400 South State Street. The first fruit stand on Provo Bench was opened c. 1913 at 1301 North State Street.⁵

In the earliest days of the town, surplus agricultural products were marketed, via wagon-load, on a small scale throughout the region and state. However, in order for the city's economic base to survive, it was necessary to expand the market for agricultural products outside the local area. The arrival of the Salt Lake and Utah Railroad, or "Orem Line" in July 1913 provided the avenue for transporting the locally-grown products all over the greater West.

The Salt Lake and Utah interurban train system was significant to the development of both the local and emerging national freight transportation systems. The 1916 railroad timetable shows twenty trains a day traveling through Orem, making stops at the four Orem stations located along what is now Orem Boulevard at 700 North (Orem Station), 400 South (Snow Station), 800 South (Lincoln Station), and 1200 South (Curtis Station). The most significant of these stations was Snow Station, where several fruit and produce packing buildings or sheds were built as part of the station and depot area for the purpose of preparing local crops for shipment across the country. Many older Orem residents remember bringing loads of fruit to these packing sheds as children, then helping to unload and prepare them for shipping. The only building from the Snow Station depot still present is the TCMA Building.⁶

The Timpanogos Cooperative Marketing Association purchased a 1.15 acre plot of land lying directly adjacent to the railroad tracks from Russell K. Homer on 22 June 1925. The TCMA Building was constructed around 1926 in a vernacular version of the then popular Prairie School style. This architectural form was based on the work of Frank Lloyd Wright and was popular in Utah primarily during the years 1905-1925. Prairie School-style buildings in Utah were predominantly residential, although a few ecclesiastical and civic buildings were constructed using the design. Less common in Utah was the utilization of the Prairie School style in buildings constructed for industrial or commercial use, making this building a unique addition to the architectural history of Orem.⁷

By 1947, the Salt Lake and Utah Railroad was no longer operating, its assets were placed into receivership, and most of the buildings of Snow Station were demolished. In 1951, the railroad right-of-way was purchased by Orem City. The tracks were removed in order to construct the thoroughfare Orem Boulevard. Although no longer associated with the railroad, the TCMA Building continued to be used as a produce processing and packing facility until 1960, when the property was sold to Moroni Woodruff and June Jensen. Ownership of the property changed several times from 1960 to 1978, when it was purchased by the construction firm of Prestwich and Healey (Glen S. Healey and Harold L. Prestwich, principals). In 1984, the property was sold to Edmond P.

and Ora M. Hyatt, who originally slated the building for demolition, but chose instead to make some minor building alterations and convert the building to general commercial use. In 1996, two-thirds of the building was leased by Mary Louise Zeller for The Elite Academy of Taekwondo, a teaching dojo and martial arts studio which has garnered multiple national and international awards. The property is currently owned by Steven A. Bishop and presently houses a small automobile dealership in addition to the "The Elite Academy."⁸

Because of the later settlement of Orem City, very few commercial or industrial buildings were constructed until after the turn of the century, and most of those were usually replaced by larger or more permanent structures from the 1930s onward. Two reconnaissance level surveys, conducted in 1994 and 1995, recorded very few commercial/industrial buildings within the city limits, and only nine historic commercial buildings retain their historic integrity. Orem's commercial/industrial area developed in a random fashion, with commercial buildings generally being scattered along or in close proximity to State Street, so the presence of these structures are significant in describing Orem's patterns of growth.⁹ The TCMA Building is particularly significant under Criteria A, as it reflects the growth which occurred once fruit growers reached out-of-state markets and became more prosperous.
