Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

This wood and concrete single-story house follows the creole style typical of local plantation and summer residences. The ample balcony, raised floor level, pitched roofs and elegant central stair are all characteristic of the latter. In this example, however, elements of distinctive neoclassic taste were used, as can be seen in the balcony railing and the simplified doric columns. The round porch projecting from one of the main facade's corners shows the influence of Victorian architecture as well as the curved brackets, wood lattices, roof metal shingles and the hexagonal nook in the living room.

The use of concrete is limited to the balcony railing, columns and base walls that support the wood post and beam structure. Wood siding is used for the walls, floors and ceilings (some floors have been covered with vinyl and concrete tiles). The fine exterior windows and doors combine wood louvers and glass panes providing both ventilation and light. Paneled doors were used for the interiors with the traditional transoms made of wood sticks. Good craftmanship is evident in the detailing of mouldings, bases, etc. the kitchen is particularly interesting, with its masonry oven and tile flooring. Pitched and sloped roofs are used throughout the house.

The residence is in good condition. Modern alterations are limited to the enclosure of the back porch, and minor changes to the interior finishes (vinyl tiles, light fixtures, etc.). These elements are non contribuing but do not affect the structure's integrity.

Villa Julita, a summer residence for the wealthy Vendrell-Suarez family, was designed and built by one of Puerto Rico's most renowed Architects, Alfredo Weichers using a variation of his typical Beaux Arts Style. Weichers, a native of Ponce studied architecture in the Beaux Arts Academy in Paris where he obtained a gold medal for outstanding archievements in 1901. The graduated in 1905 and worked for the famous Barcelonian (Barcelona, Spain) architect Enric Sangier until 1911 when he returned to his native city. Some of his best works, most of them in the city of Ponce, are: The Logia Aurora (Freemasons Lodge), the Bank of Ponce, The Serrallés City Mansion, and his own residence (Villaronga House), included in the NRHP in 08-24-84.

For this Summer Villa Weicher combined the traditional Puerto Rican "Criollo style with the more sophisticated Beaux Arts elements creating a unique structure for its time and a model for similar structures.

In 1917 the property was purchased by the wealthy Ponce family, the Wirshing Serrallés, who sold it to the Ulrich Foundation in 1972. This foundation used the property since 1950, making it a residence for conscientious objectors, to the Korean and Viet Nam Wars. This Menonite foundation used the Villa's land for agricultural education purposes in the Aibonito area. They introduced many modern methods for vegetable and fruit mass production, and were one of the first to bring cattle artificial insemination techniques to the island.

The property was bought in 1974 by its present owner who uses a part of the structure as a Integral Development Center for preschool children, thus introducing modern educational concepts to this rural community.


Villa Julita still preserves its elegant style and stands as a reminder of Aibonito's golden years where many of the Wealthy families of Puerto Rico had their Summer Houses. Today most of these vacation mansions have disappeared, only a few, like Villa Julita, still struggle to survive.
