### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The 1894 Sullivan - Kinney house is a two-story mansard house of local sandstone. It is dominated by its fish-scale cut shingle mansard roof and a tower-like entrance block set at a 45 degree angle in the left corner of the facade. This entry tower contains double doors with a transom, flanked by pilasters. Lintels are decorated with rather eccentric and primitive floral motifs. The corner tower is balanced by a square one-story bay window on the right side.

There are two dormer windows in the street facade of the house and three on each other side. These are pedimented and bracketed. The whole was, until quite recently, topped by cast iron cresting. Fortunately, enough survives in the hands of the present owner to make restoration possible through re-casting. A side entrance marks the south side, between pairs of transomed windows.

General condition of the fabric is fair, although there is some deterioration of individual pieces of sandstone which are spalling and eroded. These should be replaced.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

There are, at the present, about a dozen mansard houses in all of Idaho. This is the only one known to have been built of stone. Because of its truly unique character and rarity, the Sullivan - Kinney house has great significance for all of Idaho, as well as for the city of Pocatello. Only one other house in the area has more importance from an architectural point of view, and it (the Judge D.W. Standrod mansion) is in the French Renaissance Revival chateau style.

Preservation and restoration of the Sullivan - Kinney house is clearly indicated as an important priority for Idaho's Historic Preservation Plan.

The house was built in 1894 by Garrett Sullivan, Bannock County Sheriff. Edward C. Kinney, who purchased it ten years later, lived in the house longer than any other owner, and it is locally remembered by his name.
