#### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Lisbon Inn is a Queen Ann style white clapboard building with an L shaped plan and symmetrical facade. It has two rectangular front corner towers. The towers stand as tall as the facades, three stories high, except for their pyrimidal caps with kicks which rise above the otherwise flat roof of the rest of the structure. Both towers have 2 over 2 double hung sash windows on the central broader portion on the second and third floors and single 2 over 2 sash windows on their opposing narrower sides on all three floors. The central broader portion of the towers on the first floor have single paned fixed plate glass windows.

Between the towers, the Inn is 5 bays wide on the first story with single paned fixed plate glass windows and a central double door entrance. The upper third portion of the double doors are glazed. There are 8 bays on the second story, one of which (third from right tower), is a door leading onto the second story porch. The third story has 7 bays with four attic vents and a former title plate, arranged symmetrically, above them. All the windows of the facade and towers on the second and third stories have louvered blinds and are 2 over 2 sash.

Back from the facade, the building ground level descends toward the Ammonoosuc River forming a basement story. This section is brick above ground and seven bays deep on the east elevation with doors in the third and seventh bays. The rear elevation on the lower level is three bays wide with a door forming the first bay. The recessed portion of the rear elevation is three bays wide on the lower level with a door in the center bay. The west elevation is four bays wide with a door on the second bay back from the facade on the left towards the rear, and one bay wide on the recessed portion.

All the windows and doors on the basement level, except for one secondary door, have segmental arches and all window sills are granite slab. The window arrangement is irregular on the sides and back of the building but the second story of the wooden portion is most representative of the overall fenestration.

The east elevation is eight bays wide; the rear elevation is two bays wide on the left portion and five bays wide on the recessed portion to the right. There are five bays on the recessed portion of the west elevation and two bays on the right side. The windows are flat arched and have double hung two over two sash.

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The porch system attached to the facade is symmetrical with Colonial Revival features. The first story level of the porch extends along the facade. Ten free standing wooden columns support the sloping porch roof, which is pedimented above the tower windows. The main entrance to the Inn is entered at the center of the porch by one granite slab step to the porch. The smaller second story porch has only four free standing columns supporting a flat roof and is placed symmetrically above the front entrance. Both porches have turned balustrades. There is also an entrance on the first story porch level left tower.

There is an overhanging Lisbon Inn sign which is a modified oval with black background, gold lettering, and green trim by J. Ogden. The brick chimney is to the right and slightly behind the left tower.

The main entrance room has a tin ceiling with wainscoting on the lower third portion of the walls. There is a fireplace with a carved wooden mantel to the left of the entrance. To the right of the entrance is a staircase with a wainscoted balustrade. The molding around the doors and windows have decorative corner blocks. Also in the main lobby area is a wainscoted mail and reception desk.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Lisbon Inn is a key architectural component in Lisbon's central business district. The rectangular clapboard block with traditional two-tiered piazza employs both Queen Anne and Colonial Revival details. The resulting transitional style is an outstanding example of turn-of-the-century vernacular architecture, and exemplifies the generally eclectic architectural fabric of the surrounding village. Because of its grand scale and prominent corner towers, the Inn provides an emphatic visual terminus to downtown Lisbon's commercial streetscape.


