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Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Swedish Evangelical Lutheran Church is located on a wooded hilltop, surrounded by a cemetery, in the northcentral rural area of Anoka County, known as Ham Lake. The design of the church, which is simple and restrained, is characteristic of Swedish Lutheran churches throughout rural Minnesota. The well-preserved exterior and interior of the church represent one of a few such churches that remain in their original condition in the state.

The church is the result of three building phases. The original church, constructed by members of the congregation in 1872 of locally logged and sawn pine, is a simple rectangular shaped structure on a stone foundation. This gabled structure is embellished with Gothic arched, stained glass windows, and by corner pilaster strips. This section of the church originally faced west; it was later moved by a team of horses to face north. In 1891 an enclosed front entryway and bell tower were constructed on the church's front facade. The exposed stickwork and the shingled spire on the bell tower reflect features characteristic of Victorian styles popular at the time. A one story gabled rear wing was added in 1947 to provide a Sunday School room and a sacristy.

The interior of the church, based on a simple, central-hall plan, is in an excellent state of preservation. The interior furnishings, including the altar and pulpit, were constructed by Swedish craftsmen at Reed and Sherwood Sash and Door Company of Anoka -- a firm that gained statewide fame for their quality of design and craftsmanship.

Although the use of the church is for ceremonial purposes only, it is maintained in an excellent state of preservation.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

This Swedish Evangelical Lutheran Church, one of Minnesota's best-preserved rural Swedish Lutheran churches, is the most representative structure associated with the Swedish heritage of Ham Lake.

The congregation that planned, designed, and built this church was formed in 1872 by Anoka County's largest community of immigrants -- Ham Lake's Swedish settlers. The land for the church, the lumber for its construction, the interior furnishings, and the planting of trees, were all donated, manufactured, or grown by members of this Swedish community. The religious, social, and educational needs of Ham Lake's rural Scandinavian population were met by this church.

Although the congregation has constructed a new church nearby, this church continues to be maintained and preserved for periodic use by the congregation.
