Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

The Somerset County Courthouse is a large rectangular structure constructed of brick with stone trim. Standing three stories high, the main section (1873) is in the Italianate style and features round arched and segmental arched window caps, brick corbelling and a wood cornice supported on brackets. The standing seam metal roof is hipped and originally included a cupola (removed in 1904). The main entrance to the building is on the narrow west facade where there is a pedimented pavillion and a one-story portico. This latter feature is supported on chamfered granite posts and includes a cornice with brackets and a shallow pediment reflecting the design of the roof above.

A 1904 addition consists of an extension by two bays on the east end of the building. For this section the original design was repeated on the exterior. The interior, however, was remodelled throughout the courthouse. This woodwork is still largely intact. In 1938 a two-story west wing continued the Italianate motifs of the 1873 building, although it has a flat roof and stone trim was not used.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Though obviously an architecturally distinguished building, the work of two outstanding architects, the Somerset County Courthouse has, as well, an interesting political history.

Charles F. Douglas, whose short meteoric career is recounted in the National Register nomination for his own house in Norridgewock (12-18-78), designed the original structure in 1873. The business of the county outgrew the building by the end of the century and the courthouse was enlarged and remodelled in 1904 with great sensitivity to Douglas' design by John Calvin Stevens, indisputably Maine's most famous architect.

On March 1, 1909, the northern part of the Kennebec County was incorporated under the name of Somerset County with Norridgewock as the shire town. A later act of 1872 changed the county seat to Skowhegan provided that town would provide a suitable place for holding court within a very short time or the act would be void. Skowhegan immediately propared temporary space, but the County Commissioners declared it unsatisfactory, there being great division of opinion between Norridgewock and Skowhegan.

Much litigation ensued which was only settled when ex-Governor Abner Coburn of Skowhegan, perhaps the wealthiest man in the state, offered to pay for a large formal courthouse at the latter place, an offer the county as a whole could not refuse.
