### DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The United States Post Office in Carthage is located on the town square directly northwest of the courthouse. It is vaguely Colonial Revival in style with the prismatic quality of the Art Deco style. A concrete basement level rises above grade to the elevated main floor, which is made accessible by a flight of granite steps with cast iron railings. The basement with windows is revealed on the front facade by an areaway. A continuous pipe railing runs in front of this areaway at grade to either side of the central doorway. terior walls consist of one full story crowned by a wide limestone frieze and cornice. A simple hipped roof covered in slate shingles exists over the public lobby area with a hidden gutter system behind the cornice. Over the work area is a flat roof of the built-up variety surrounded by a low parapet. A square cupola with lowered central panels and corner lights crowns the roof ridge over the central bay. The main facade is divided into five bays reading windowwindow-door-window-window. The central doorway is articulated as a deeply recessed bay, as are all the window bays, and by a transom light with a decorative cast metal grill in front of it featuring an eagle. Additionally, two masonry abutments and a pair of freestanding lamp standards with dish-shaped globes flank the central doorway. Windows in this facade are wooden triple hung, six over six over six sash with limestone sills and large, limestone recessed panels under the sills running to the water table. The south and north facades consist of four bays each with the south facade modified slightly to accommodate the vault area. A slight setback also occurs behind the lobby space on these facades. A swing room and loading vestibule project from the center of the west facade. A full basement level exists. Brick masonry laid in the common bond is used throughout above the basement level.

The interior plan (see attached plan drawings) consists of an L-shaped lobby with the postmaster's office on the southeast corner. The remaining area is given over to a large workroom and the aforementioned rear projection. A small mezzanine level containing a lookout is located over the vault area. The lobby contains a polychrome terrazzo floor and granite wainscoting. The original screenline remains intact as does the entry vestibule.

A wood sculpture by Peter Dalton shows men working as logger, was commissioned under the Treasury Bureau's Section of Fine Arts program and was completed and installed in 1941 at a cost of \$750. (See attached Fine Arts Inventory form).

### STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE Politics/Government

The first Public Buildings Act of 1913 and the second Public Building Act of 1926 were supplemented in 1933 by Congress, on the urging of Franklin Delano Roosevelt, with the Federal Emergency Administration of Public Works. Between 1933 and 1941 a tremendous amount of construction resulted in the United States, including four post offices in Mississippi constructed under the 1926 Act and thirty-two post offices in Mississippi constructed under 1933 PWA legislation.

The U.S. Post Office in Carthage, Mississippi, built in 1939, is significant as being one of thirty-two post offices constructed in the state with Public Works Administration funds during the Great Depression. It was designed by Shelby Olvy Yarborough. The building has the distinction of being the first federal building constructed in Leake County. (See also "Federal Construction Work, 1913-1941").

### Architecture

The Courthouse, the City Hall, and this post office represent the three most significant governmental public buildings in the community and this building is the most significant of the three architecturally. Certainly the structure's prismatic quality, inherent in the rigid, punctured outer walls, can be traced to Style Moderne, but the amalgamation of this attribute with a hipped roof and cupola (also prismatic), typically Colonial Revival features, is unique. The refinement of proportion and detailing suggests that this structure's designer, Shelby Olvy Yarborough, was an architect of considerable ability.

### Art

The Department of the Treasury's Section of Fine Arts Program was begun by Franklin Delano Roosevelt, and in two phases, the Public Works of Art Project and the Section of Painting and Sculpture, several thousand artists produced multiple thousand pieces of art throughout the United States, including sculpture and mural paintings.

The building is significant because of the beautiful wood carving which depicts lumberjacks at work. The carving is appropriate because the lumber industry makes an important economic contribution to the community. The handsome wood carving was done by sculptor Peter Dalton, of New York City. Mr. Dalton was commissioned by the Section of Fine Arts of the Public Buildings Administration to do the work. (See also "The Treasury Department's Section of the Fine Arts Program").





APPROACH PLAN EXTENSION SERVICE




PLAN OF LOOKOUT OVER VAULT
