Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

7. Description

The Wichita Wholesale Grocery Company building is located at what used to be the corner of William street and Fifth avenue, in the heart of the old warehouse district. The area immediately surrounding the warehouse is now empty lots, parking lots, and low-lying office and industrial structures. To the east of the building are the railroad tracks that used to provide direct service to the warehouse. To the north and northwest is the Carey House District a local and state designated turn-of-the-century commercial district. The Wholesale Grocery building is in excellent condition and has been altered very little since it was constructed in 1894.

The 75 feet by 120 feet Wichita Wholesale Grocery Company building originally was oriented toward the railroad tracks to the east. The street that ran on that side was Fifth avenue, no vacated. The other major facade was the north one, facing Williams street (now William). The entire structure is solid brick with heavy timber interior framing and sits on a raised basement. The north and east facades have a corbelled brick cornice beneath the parapet wall. The west facade also has corbelling near the cornice, but no parapet.

The 75 foot east facade has five bays of paired windows on all floors above the first floor. Those on the second and third floors have segmental arches, those on the fourth floor have rounded arches. On the lower level are loading doors and a large round arched window at the northeast corner. This window and four others like it on the north facade indicate where a sales room and office of the warehouse were located. The rest of the fenestration on the north side consists of regularly spaced segmental arched windows. At the west end is a large arched entranceway with a "K" carved in stone at the peak of the arch. This was probably done in the 1920's when Knorr Mercantile took over the building and did some remodeling.

The warehouse has undergone some minor alterations since it was constructed. The parapet wall was originally capped with what appear to have been decorative pots. Those are now
gone. The platform on the east wall formerly had steps at the north end and probably at the
south end as well. Two of the four large arched windows on the north wall were remodeled into
loading doors at some point. Another building now abuts the south wall where all windows
have been bricked in.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

The 1894 Wichita Wholesale Grocery Company building is the last remaining multi-storied warehouse in what was historically a major warehouse district in Wichita. The building typi-fies warehouse construction and is a significant reminder of a once-important industry in Wichita.

The warehouse at the corner of William street and Fifth avenue is the third structure that the Wichita Wholesale Grocery company occupied between 1884 and 1894. After a fire destroyed its original facilities on Water street, the company moved to temporary quarters on South Market street, a few blocks west of where their new building was constructed.

Ground for the company's new warehouse was broken on April 7, 1894. The next day the Wichita Eagle reported that "outside of the packing houses the building will be one of the strongest, if not the strongest, house in the city." It measured 75 feet on Fifth avenue and 120 feet on Williams street. The foundations were six feet wide. In typical warehouse fashion pillars were situated one above the other through all four floors. The sale room at the north east corner of the building was called "spacious and well-fitted" by the Eagle. The location of the sale room is easily determined today by the decorative pressed metal ceiling, cast-iron columns, and elaborate door and window surrounds.

The wholesale grocers were an extremely important industry in Wichita and according to early newspaper accounts, the Wichita Wholesale Grocery Company pioneered in the field. In May, 1912, the Wichita Eagle reported that "despite the financial depression that has pervaded the entire country, the Wichita wholesale grocers have experienced an increase and expansion of business. . ." At that time there were five wholesale grocery houses in Wichita whose sales amounted to more than \$5,000,000 annually.

The Wichita Wholesale Grocery Company apparently went out of business in 1925, when it ceased to appear in the city directories. In 1927 the <u>Industrial Survey of Wichita, Kansas</u> reported two other wholesale grocery outfits in that building — Jett and Wood Mercantile and Knorr Mercantile. Knorr remained in the building until 1945. Merchants Van and Storage was a long-term occupant, and their signage is still painted at the top of the building. The structure is still being used as a warehouse but plans are underway to renovate it for office use.


