STATEMENT The Miller House is a distinctive local expression of Italianate residential architecture. Its simple, nearly cubic form displays a frontal symmetry common to many early local examples of the style, but has been handsomely embellished with a variety of window shapes, unusual gambrel-roofed dormers, and entrance porch of simple columns and curved brackets, that together make the house a work of considerable merit. NIFICANCE

This building was the residence of the city's largest wholesale grocery jobber I in the period between the Civil War and 1900. Because Miller was the junior partner in the firm and the residence of C. Beiderbeck is extant, the significance of this property is diminished.

DESCRIPTION

Frank H. Miller, a German immigrant, came to Davenport in 1856 from Cincinnati. He became the junior partner in the retail grocery firm, Beiderbecke and Miller a short time later. The company propsered during the Civil War, gradually adding wholesale jobbing to their retail business. By 1880 the firm was located in a new building and their business was confined to wholesale trade. In the late 1880's, Beiderbecke and Miller employed 21 hands and 5 salesmen in Iowa and Illinois. They were the largest wholesale grocer in the city by then. The company was discontinued in 1901 when Charles Beiderbecke died.
