DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Dr. Harry S. Graves House sets on a fifty by one hundred and twenty feet corner lot in the small town of Hurley. Its height ranges from one and one half stories in the front to two and one half story in the rear. Exteriorly the only major change is a one story rear addition that was done in sympathy to the building's character. Although the structure does not lend itself to any particular design its vernacular architecture definitely relates to the Victorian period.

One such Victorian element is its highly irregular roofline which consists of numerous jerkinheads, levels and dormers. This type of arrangement is highly unusual. Another prominent feature is a rectangular type bay window with a mansard roof and two center windows with a mullion division. The structure's porch has also retained its period appearance with spindle supports, mansard roof and a key hole perferated motif.

The dwelling's fenestrations are for the most part rectangular in shape, double hung with two sashes and have lintel and slip sill surrounds. Clapboard and some shingles same as the building's siding while both asphalt and wood shinglings cover the roof. Some secondary features include two single stack chimneys and brackets under the smaller dormer's eaves.

## STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

Each town has houses and buildings that relate to the craftsmanship and ideals of another time; these structures provide an aesthetic quality to the community. One such house in Hurley, is the Dr. Harry S. Graves House which has architectural significance for the city. Unusual design and well preserved appearance make it an interesting structure.

Another important facet is that Graves used a portion of his home for his medical office. This practice was fairly common in South Dakota and points out a way of small town life which has disappeared. The importance is that the structure provides an example of how the medical profession was carried on in rural communities.

Graves, who came to Hurley from Iowa in 1883, was the only doctor for this area for a long time. He had the house built in 1892 and occupied it until 1918. At this time Earl Rundell purchased the dwelling for \$3,500; he owned the chevrolet garage. A great many of the Rundell clan located in Turner County which points out an interesting settlement pattern that has one segment of a family locate in an area first soon to be followed by the others. The line of ownership then went as follows: Myrtle and Harvey Schell 1930-1946, Owen and Earl Rundell 1946-1952, Raymond Elliot 1952-1964, and Robert Sedelmeiers is the present owner.
