Description

The C. W. Cisney House was constructed in ca. 1900. The builder was C.W. Cisney. The building is constructed in the Colonial Revival architectural style and represents the Builder's Plan Book property type. It retains integrity of design, materials, and workmanship. The C. W. Cisney House is presently utilized as a single family dwelling.

The C. W. Cisney House is located in Block 35, Lot 3 of the West Capitol Addition. The West Capitol Addition was originally platted in 1892. The building faces north onto West Madison Street. The streetscape along West Madison Street is characterized by modest, working class residences. No outbuildings exist on the site, which is lushly landscaped.

The C. W. Cisney House is a rectangular, two-story building of brick construction. The building measures 30×40 feet. The steeply pitched hip roof is covered with asphalt shingles. Large hip roofed dormers project from each of the roof slopes. The brick walls are sheathed with stucco. It has a stone foundation.

Exterior features include a hip roofed veranda with wood posts, and a dormer balcony at the facade. Windows are evenly located on the walls and are wood, double hung with one over one lite sash. The central entry has a wood panel, glazed door with side lites. Important architectural elements include enclosed eaves with cornice molding and frieze boards. Knee braced frame walls support the hipped roof at the balcony dormer.

Alterations are limited to small, historic one-story additions to the rear and east. The building is in fair condition with material deterioration due to lack of maintenance.

Statement of Significance

The C. W. Cisney House is significant under Criteria C under the area of significance of Architecture. It is representative of the historic context "Residential Architecture in Phoenix Prior to 1901." Built in ca.1900 and constructed in the Colonial Revival architectural style, the C. W. Cisney House is representative of the Builder's Plan Book property type. The C. W. Cisney House is also important in the area of Community Planning. As one of only fifteen nineteenth century buildings remaining in the West Capitol Addition which was originally platted in 1892, the C. W. Cisney House represents a rare survivor of its period and the historic context "Nineteenth Century Community Development in Phoenix."

A popular architectural style used during the plan book era was the Colonial Revival style. The use of the style in residential architecture was wide spread in the late nineteenth century. Closely followed copies of plan book examples of the style, as demonstrated by the C.W. Cisney House, were once common. The house illustrates a local interpretation of the plan book designs that resulted in an elaborately detailed building which incorporates the major stylistic concepts of Colonial architecture. With the exception of stucco applied over the brick walls and small additions to the south and west, the Colonial Revival inspired design of the C.W. Cisney House remains intact. Stylistic features include an overall attention to symmetry in plan, massing, and facade elements. The steeply pitched hip roof, also characteristic of the style, and the large hip roof

dormers and the facade length veranda, also contribute to its symmetry. Representative details include the enclosed soffits, cornice molding and frieze boards at the eave, and a central raised panel, glazed door with side lites.

Built by local contractor C.W. Cisney as his own residence, the house is a specific example of a builder's reliance on plan book designs for residential construction.
