when the developer of the William Hughes Department Store on Main Street (see State Form 82-196-0025) erected that large edifice in 1911, a relatively small annex was constructed around the corner on Fifth. This Indiana limestone annex was built, presumably, according to the designs of the architect of the Hughes Store, Manson Gilbert.

The occupants of the annex building have included two prominent Evansville institutions. From its date of construction until 1925, the building was associated with the city's oldest newspaper. The Evansville Journal. The newspaper was succeeded by the Evansville Public Library which used the building as its Central Library until 1931 and the construction of the new main branch two blocks to the southeast.

The associations with the paper and the library and the connection with the architectural work of Gilbert, one of the city's best-known eclectics, combine to make the building significant.

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Although not readily apparent, this building is actually two separate, contemporaneous ones, both designed in 1910: by architect F. Manson Gilbert. The largest section, 9-11 NW 5th Street (see period photo copy on form), was erected to house the Journal News facility. Later, the Public Library was quartered there. The smaller, narrower section (7 NW Fifth St.) was built with similar materials and in similar style to serve as the men's furnishings department (called the annex) for the Hughes Department Store on Main Street.
