DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Weaver Hotel in Waterville is a three-story rectangular building with a full basement located at the northwest corner of Kansas and Front streets. It measures 22 feet wide and 90 feet long. The architectural style of the hotel is a simplified application of Renaissance Revival. Precast concrete blocks formed with a face texture to resemble rough hewn stone comprise the white-painted exterior walls. flat roof of the building is concealed behind the parapet wall. One of the main features of the building is a corner entrance which is set off by a one-story wood porch along the south side, around the corner and approximately half the length of the east front. The porch columns are simple and circular with vertical fluting. Above the porch is a wood balustrade forming a balcony on the porch roof. building corner at the southeast entrance is rounded through the full three stories and is accented by a decorative iron cornice and a parapet. Modulating the iron cornice are four large decorative brackets, which are interspersed with smaller iron brackets. An ornate pediment located directly above the curved wall bears the name "Weaver Hotel." Window openings on all three floor levels have simple rectangular double-hung windows. The window sills are of stone and project slightly from the wall; window heads are one-piece flat cast concrete lintels which project similarly. Door openings are treated like the windows. One three-sided bay is situated at the north end of the second floor. Horizontal bands of smoothed masonry accent the floor lines at all three levels. On the south wall between the two first floor windows is a cast concrete lion's head. Above it is the date 1905 and the names of Brooks and Schmidt, the The reason for the lion's head other than ornamentation isn't known. contractors.

The hotel has the original 12 guest rooms on the third floor, a number of guest rooms and a parlor on the second, and restaurant and dining facilities. A recent complete refurbishing has brightened the interior and made the old hotel an attractive place to dine and lodge.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Weaver Hotel in Waterville was built in 1905-1906 by William E. Weaver for his parents, the Luce E. Weavers, who operated a local restaurant. L. E. Weaver entered the restaurant business by opening an ice cream parlor in Waterville in June, 1877, and shortly thereafter added restaurant and bakery facilities. His old frame business building was temporarily moved east onto South Kansas street in March, 1905, when work began on the new hotel. J. J. Brooks and Herman Schmidt of Hanover manufactured the cement blocks for the building's exterior and also erected the structure. W. E. Fitzgerald of Waterville had the contract for the woodwork.

Work on the cellar and the foundation was underway by early May, 1905, and by early August the cement and stone work was completed. The floors were laid in August, the cisterns dug in October, the carpets put down the following April, and the old frame building razed in May, 1906. The hotel was opened for business by mid-May, 1906 and quickly became a popular place with railroad travelers and the local residents. W. E. Weaver and his wife Imogene assisted his parents with the hotel, and after his death and his parents' deaths, Mrs. Imogene Weaver managed the hotel for many years. The hotel, except for two or three closures because of repairs or the proprietor's death, has been in continuous operation since its opening.

In October, 1969, the old hotel, which was by then in a state of disrepair, was purchased by Mrs. Ina Roeth. Under her direction the building was renovated and most of the public areas redecorated in a manner reflecting the Victorian turn-of-the-century elegance. Although 12 small rooms on the third floor are still rented to guests, the hotel has primarily acquired a reputation for gourmet dining.

The Weaver Hotel is the only three-story building in Waterville and has been a local landmark since its construction in 1905-1906. Architecturally, it was one of the first large buildings in the area to be constructed of cement blocks. The Weaver Hotel has local importance for its 70 years of service to the community.
