DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The Methodist Church in Rock Rapids is a Romanesque Revival building, constructed of blue-gray granite laid in a random ashlar pattern, trimmed with red granite. A modern brick wing extends from the south end of the main structure. The church is situated on a corner lot in a mixed urban-residential district of the town.

The church measures 68' x 80', with the main roof ridge running east-west, and smaller, gable-roofed pavilions on north and south. A section for overflow seating extends from the south side of the sanctuary, and is covered by a low, truncated hipped roof. At the northwest corner is a two-stage square tower, the base of which forms an entrance to the narthex. All gable ends, and the high-pitched tower roof, are shingled.

The round or Romanesque arch is used in tryptich windows on north and west sides, each surmounted by an oculus window. Tower windows are narrow rectangles. The tower entrance is round arched, as are the louvred openings in the bellchamber. All the round arches are shaped from voussoirs of alternating red and gray granite. Imposts are of red granite, as are the heads of the rectangular windows. Red granite is also used in a narrow course below the eaves of the tower, and on the high water table.

During 1953-4, the basement was extensivelly remodelled, the walls lined with cement block, windows of glass block installed, and wooden support members replaced. The nave was also redecorated at this time. The 1966 addition to the south consists of a lobby faced with granite ashlar and a square, brick education wing, all under a very low mansard roof. The paired windows are very tall, with round arches, clearly an attempt to reflect elements of the main structure.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Methodist Church in Rock Rapids is significant primarily for the interesting combination of blue-grayand red granite used in its construction. The red granite is used principally for details, most notably the voussoirs of alternating colors, and the decorative coursing on the tower. The plan of the church, too, is of interest, being a typical example of that popularized by H.H. Richardson. The implication, in the massing, is of a Greek Cross plan, but this is not carried through in the interior arrangement. This plan is particularly suited for corner locations, and sites from which a church is viewed obliquely, and from a distance.

The Methodist congregation in Rock Rapids was organized in the 1870's, and the first church building built about 1879. The second (present) building was begun in 1895. Blue-gray granite was quarried near Sioux Falls, SD, the red trimming stone obtained from the receiver of a bankrupt packing plant which had begun — but never finished — a stone building in Sioux Falls of this material.
