The old United States Mint is a large three story brick building, cement plaster stuccoed on the exterior, with granite trim. In front of the wide, pedimented central bay is a projecting, elevated, flat-roofed, Ionic portico with four columns and two square antae, at each side. central bay and corners of the building are defined by granite pilasters above the basement story. The base watertable and belt course at the first floor level are also of granite. The deep, Greek Revival cornice is of wood. The exterior stairs to the main entrance ascend from each side beneath the portico, concealed by basement wall in the center of which is a minor entrance to the ground floor level. The central bay extends through the depth of the building with a gable or pediment in the rear similar to the one in front. This central section of the plan contains a spacious stair hall and the largest rooms in the building extending across the back. \ On either side of this central plan element are L-shaped wings giving the building an E-shaped plan. These wings have broad galleries supported on cast iron columns on the two inner sides. The end gables extend across the full depth of the wings with the courts and galleries forming an apparent penetration into a much larger building mass.

In the original building contract, dated August 22, 1835, passed before the New Orleans notary, Joseph Cuvillier, the building was described as follows:

The main or principal building shall consist of a center of Ninety feet in front on Esplanade Street, with wings on each side of Ninety six feet each fronting on said street; making the whole of said front two hundred and Eighty two feet by a depth of Eighty one feet.

The Elevation of said Buildings shall be of the height (sic) height of three stories, resting on a sub-basement of two feet in the clear - The 18/ height; the basement to be Eleven feet high in the clear - The principal story to be of the height of sixteen feet in the clear; to be covered with a Slate-Roof. principal story to be of the height or sixteen recording the whole of said Buildings to be covered with a Slate-Roof. Front Portico and Steps

There are to be four columns of three feet in diameter FGROP of the center building; these are to be flanked by antae or pilaster of two feet-nine inches square showing a single faced pilaster; towards the columns - These columns are to be made of brick and rough cast; having stone bases and Capitals of the Ionic order. The whole depth of the Portico from the line of the street containing behind the check blocks upon which the columns and antea rest, a flight of granite steps leading from the pavement to the floor of the principal story. The architrave to be of granite, two feet two inches in height, by two feet nine inches in width, extending across the whole front of the portico, breaking joint over the center of each Column; the frieze to be constructed with brick work and the cornice of wood - The portico to be covered on a level with the cornice, with a flat roof of copper or zinc.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE


The old United States Mint occupies the site of Fort St. Charles one of a series of forts in the fortifications erected around New Orleans by the Spanish Governor Carondelet in 1792. The fort was demolished after the Louisiana Purchase, probably about 1817. A park was then established on the site named Jackson Square in honor of the hero of the Battle of New Orleans, who reviewed his troops here before the battle. By an ordinance dated May 11, 1835, the city council ceded the site to the United States Government for the erection of a branch mint.

The building was designed by the noted Greek Revivalist Architect, William Strickland and is one of the most important Greek Revival structures in New Orleans. The builders were John Mitchell and Benjamin F. Fox. In the 1850's the building was extensively remodelled to make it as fireproof as possible, the work being directed by the engineer P.G.T. Beauregard, the noted Confederate General. The mint was occupied by the Confederate Government which minted some coins here. At the time of the capture of New Orleans by Federal forces in 1862, William Mumford was hanged for tearing down the United States flag.

When the minting of coins was discontinued in 1909, the building was converted into a federal prison, and during World War II was used as a Coast Guard Receiving Station. In 1966 the building was transferred to the State of Louisiana for preservation as a historic landmark. Louisiana State Museum was designated as the State Agency responsible for administration, maintenance, preservation and restoration. Complete plans and drawings for restoration and public use as a Museum and central focal point of the Vieux Carre Mall area are now being prepared; and it is hoped funds will then be made available. The building was one of the few rated as of national importance, historically

architecturally, by the Vieux Carre Survey.
