

This house, while having been altered through the years, still retains a sufficient amount of its original fabric that it should be recognized and retained. We are therefore including it for its architectural significance, for its association with the exploration and settlement of the Bergen County area, and for its remaining historic fabric. As such, it is included in the Thematic Nomination to the National Register of Historic Places for the Early Stone Houses of Bergen County, New Jersey.

Blanch-Haring House 341 Lafayette Road, Harrington Park

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FLOOR PLANS



Richard Blanch moved here and bought this tract from Isaac Blauvelt or his son Theunius c. 1745-47. He may have built the grist mill that was here, but it is definitely known that his son, Isaac, was a miller and his son, Thomas, was a tanner. Richard died in 1767 and his son Isaac inherited this part of the property and needed a fair sized house since he had eight children. He was elected to the State Legislature in 1778 and sold the property to David Haring, whose family ran the mill through three generations. Eventually, Rachel Haring, who married Peter A. Demarest in September, 1850, inherited the property and her husband ran the mill until his death in 1883. The property was rented for a while and sold in 1899 to Catharine Varian with 19-1/4 acres. There have been other owners until the Logans bought the property in 1963.
