DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

This diminutive 18 x 26 foot office block sits on a prominent corner across from the Burnett County Courthouse. Constructed from local brick, the one story building is symmetrical in plan with the exception that the north side elevation has three windows and the south side facade has one. A parapet wall rises above the sloped roof. A shed roofed storage room measuring 12 x 16 feet is attached to the rear. Embossed metal covers the shed walls. This frame addition appears to have been used for storage of coal and firewood.

A denticulated cornice and a string course above the openings add interest to the simple form. Segmentally arched openings encase the original window glass on the north and south facades. On the front facade a compound arch accentuates the wide doorway. The door with nine lights is flanked by sidelights and a tri-partite fanlight. On either side of the entry, wooden bulletin boards are set in segmentally arched openings. These bulletin boards were used for posting legal notices required by early law. The company's name is emblazoned in metal across the front facade. A canvas awning is attached above the entry.

The interior of the building, like the exterior, has never been remodeled. The original woodwork, flooring and plaster wall finishes are intact. The vault door, made by Mitchell Safe Company, and a hot water heating stove fired by coal or wood also remain functional.

The building is presently undergoing refurbishing for use as office space. The owner, an architect, is cleaning, caulking and regrouting the brickwork as well as painting the metal and wood surfaces.

STATEMENT OF SIGNIFICANCE

The Burnett County Abstract Company building, a local landmark, has remained intact for more than 70 years. It is an excellent example of a vernacular commercial building made of local materials that has retained its character both inside and out.

When Burnett County was created in 1865 from adjacent Polk County, Grants-burg, as the only sizeable settlement, became the county seat. Growth came slowly as the community developed as a trade center for timber and agricultural interests. The village was incorporated in 1887 with a population of 334.

In 1906 six of the leading Grantsburg citizens, William Anderson, A. P. Nelson, S. Thoreson, Andrew Peterson, S. F. Grover and A. J. Myrland, incorporated as the Burnett County Abstract Company. Previously land titles and sales and claims for the county had been handled at the county courthouse or by an abstract company in St. Croix Falls, Polk County. Work was then begun on a set of abstract title records, requiring about a year to complete.

One year later, in 1908, the company constructed a permanent building conveniently located across from the courthouse where most of the legal work was done. Since the building did not, and still does not, have an indoor water and sewer hookup, employees out of necessity would find their way to courthouse facilities.

In 1916 Byron Selves bought the firm and operated it until 1944. A thriving lumber industry provided much of his business. Donald Elg, a company associate since 1919, purchased the business from Selves and remained active until his death in 1965. His son, Richard Elg, continues with the firm.

Fires and remodelings have taken their toll of most of Grantsburg's early commercial buildings. There were few brick business blocks and fewer still remain. The Burnett County Abstract Company building, tiny yet graceful, continues to be an important Grantsburg structure.
