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DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (if known) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

The <u>Daniel S. Piper House</u> is an interconnected farmstead complex complex, including a two and one half story house, a one and one half story rear dependency, and a two and one half story barn. The entire complex is wood frame construction and is styled as a late example of Greek Revival architecture. Due to the late period of construction for this particular style, the architectural trim, especially at the front entry and side entry porches, are more Italianate in character, reflecting its time of construction in 1877. The foundation material throughout the complex is local limestone, except at the rear of the barn where the structure is supported by tree trunk pylons driven into the ground.

The house is a rather large mass, uncharacteristic of the "gable end" variation of the Greek Revival residential style. The front entry is off center, being a part of an unevenly proportioned front facade. Four windows, stacked two over two, are grouped to the right of the entry.

The barn is the most characteristically "New England" looking of the complex, with its Greek Revival gable trim, its wagon doors at each gable end, and its cupola ventilator.

The farm complex has undergone very little exterior alteration with the enclosure of the side entry and the removal of one side window in the rear dependency. A new foundation was recently added under the side porch. The interior has been extensively remodeled, especially in the rear dependency which now functions as part of the living quarters, but which formerly contained the summer kitchen, wood shed and granary. The complex has been well maintained and is in excellent condition, except for the rear wall of the barn which is in need of major structural repair.

The <u>Daniel S. Piper House</u> is Minnesota's only known surviving example of an interconnected New England style farmstead, where all the farm buildings; wood shed, summer kitchen, granary, barn, and farm house, are constructed as one contiguous building. The architectural style reflects the "Yankee" heritage of the Piper family, being executed as a late example of the Greek Revival motif.

Daniel Piper immigrated to Minnesota in 1877, purchasing the farm in November of that year. He commenced construction of the complex, utilizing the talents of four master carpenters from New Hampshire, who completed the building late in 1977. Materials for the building were top grade, as Piper had been a lumberman in the East, and he personally supervised their selection. This has likely added to the excellent aging of the building which except for the rear half of the barn, remains in good structural condition.

The farm complex remains an excellent symbol of the New England heritage of many early Minnesota pioneers.
