Describe the present and original (if known) physical appearance

Elden's Store is a two-and-one-half story brick structure of rectangular dimensions. The top (attic) story has a pitched roof of frame construction with clapboarded gable ends and asphalt-shingled slopes. A gable end facing the main road serves as the facade.

The building's walls of red brick, laid in English-bond and painted red, are in excellent condition and appear massive. The walls rest on a cut granite and fieldstone foundation. Each is punctuated by windows and doors, sometimes casual in their symmetry. The south (broad) wall, facing another road, is divided into three window bays and has a central doorway; each clapboarded gable end boasts a duet of windows. Otherwise, windows and doors have been placed (or probably rearranged over the years) for convenience. The facade gable end holds three windows and three doorways, one being a large opening (presently enclosed) which leads to a basementground floor medical center.

All doors and windows have simple granite sills and lintels. First floor windows are 6/6, second and attic story windows are 12/8. Each window has one simple shutter, consisting of two boards nailed together, hanging to one side. The doors are of similar, simple character.

The first and basement floors of the building have been remodelled into a clinic, and the second floor, meeting room for the Buxton-Hollis Historical Society, is similarly contemporary.

Statement of Significance (in one paragraph)

Elden's Store is a well-preserved and rare example of a smalltown commercial building of the Federal period. The structure is among the only brick non-residential buildings of the period in western York County. The store is not only the oldest such building in Buxton, but constitutes 20% of the town's center.

The building was constructed as a general store in 1802, and served in that capacity until the 1930's. After 1857 it also housed Samuel D. Hanson's coat business, the area's most prosperous industry. At its peak in 1865-68, the Hanson Company employed upwards of 1,200 women in "cottage" coat manufacturing. A wooden ell added to the building during the boom period has since been removed. Since 1975, the town's medical facility has occupied the first and basement floors of the building. The Buxton-Hollis Historical Society has used the second floor as a meeting hall since 1971.

The wooden portion of the exterior as well as the windows have recently been restored. The English-bond brickwork shows little evidence of repointing, having remained in excellent repair.

The building's lines are clean and free of even the smallest extraneous ornament. Pleasing proportions, multipaned windows, and high quality brickwork are what give the structure its aesthetic appeal.
