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16. beaded. No water table. Window frames pegged, square wooden sills. Blocks in wall indicate house originally had a front porch. Shed porch on E end.

Square hewn studs and rafters; rafters mortise and tenoned at ridge, pegged together; log floor joists, flattened on top and bottom.

Stone wall between passage and parlor, frame wall between passage and dining room. Open stair in passage along frame wall, arises toward south front; enclosed corner stair in dining room arises from S front to "traveller's room" which has been opened to adjoining second floor rooms. (Location of stairs may indicate reversal of $\frac{plan}{plan}$.)

Chair rails throughout; beveled paneled window reveals; paneled door reveals on stone walls. Reeded trim in parlor. Breakfront parlor mantel has slender, paired colonettes, reeded panels; bands of oblique reeding angle from center; central reeded triangular panel (photo \mathcal{I}); mitered hearth trim (photo \mathcal{G}). White ash floors. Dining room mantel has gougework garland in center panel (photo). Built in presses in dining room and upstairs bedroom.

One room, two story Greek Revival frame room added to northeast corner of house ca. 1857 (carpenter was Tom Carter of LaGrange) (photo 3). Fireplaces now covered. Walls have modern siding.

Early board and batten smoke house east of house, contains stone mile marker from early road (photo-9).

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House faces south (at least since Greek Revival addition); has expansive view of Harrod's Creek Valley. Spring South of house built in 1930s. Present gambrel roofed barns constructed 1940s. Family cemetery north of house has tombstone of Eliza B. Woolfolk, consort of William Woolfolk, 1789-1837.

Farm now contains 148 acres, two acres of which have been deeded to owners' child, who built modern brick house on it.

25. K., Mildred. Was residence of Mount family mid 1800s, who added frame rooms. Mount daughter married Eads, whose name is on 1879 map.

Clarence Banks restored house 1938-58; sold to present owner.
