DESCRIBE THE PRESENT AND ORIGINAL (IF KNOWN) PHYSICAL APPEARANCE

As a good example of the typical four room central hall country residence in Georgia of the mid-nineteenth century, the Strickland House stands today on its original site near the now defunct town of Liberty Hill. The house's location is approximately one-fourth mile west of the intersection of Liberty Hill Road and Moody Bridge Road and about three and one half miles north, northeast of Antioch on Glenn Road in Troup County.

One story in height, with a full attic under a simple metal clad (original wood shingle) pitched roof, the Strickland House, approximately 30' x 36', has a central entrance, orginally with sidelights, flanked on both left and right by simple sash windows. A shed roof porch originally protected these windows and door, but it is no longer extant; the owners however, plan to rebuild this porch and two others in their attempt to restore the long-neglected house. Two exterior end chimneys on the east and west gabled ends of the house serve the two front rooms of the house. In the front room in the northwest corner of the building is a door that originally led to the house's second porch, now destryoed. A third porch, that ran across the western half of the rear of the house initially connected the residence with the kitchen; this part of the building has been destroyed and all that remains are the brick foundation supports.

The interior of the house is completely sheathed with horizontal panelling with the exception of the plastered front portion of the central hall. In the rear portion of the hall is a reverse stair leading to the attic. The two extant mantels are very similar with two simple posts directly supporting a plain mantel shelf; a narrow recessed panel runs across the top portion of the frieze.

Although only one 15 x 15 foot board and batten tenant house with rock chimney remains by the spring, oral traditon states that there was at one time at least a well house that was almost adjacent to the main house, a barn, a buggy house and smoke house on the property. The rock foundation for the buggy house is still in place, just east of the main house. Also of special interest is the environment of trees framing the house, especially a grove of oak and hickory of outstanding size just northeast of the house. About one and one-half miles north of this site is the family cemetery.

BUILDER/ARCHITECT Wilson Strickland and Sons

The Strickland House, built c.1858 by Wilson Strickland and his sons, is a locally significant structure and important to Troup County history.

Built as a "bunk" house for the four sons of Wilson and Teresa Strickland, this house was located just down Glenn Road from the Strickland family columned main house. Wilson (1808-1872) and Teresa Strickland (1807-1888) were pioneer settlers with a residence of substantial size about one mile west of this later bunk house. With numerous children in the family, Wilson offered to build the four older unmarried boys a house. They helped with the construction and were living there when the War Between the States drew the four brothers into the conflict as volunteers in Company K, 56th Regiment, Georgia Infantry, CSA. Two of the brothers, Noah Perry and W.G. Strickland, were killed in the War. W.L. and Willis Washington Strickland surrendered at Greensboro, North Carolina on April 26, 1865. Willis Washington Strickland returned to the old house to live. (p. 74-75, Davidson.)

Architecturally the Strickland House is a good example of a rural mid-nineteenth century house design. Presently it is owned by a Strickland descent who is in the process of restoring the house and grounds.
